MCINNES ATTACKS THE GLOBE.

Some Important Facts Brought Out.

THE GRIT ORGAN NOT A FREE AGENT

Foster Pleads for the Tariff and Arraigns the Government.

OTTAWA, April 10.—Before the orders of the day were called yesterday afternoon, Mr. McInnes, of British Columbia, who was denounced by his party organ, the Toronto Globe as "a liar and slanderer," paid his respects to that journal. He asserted that two directors of the Globe had a financial stake in the Crow's Nest Charter, and that the course of the Globe on that question was governed entirely by their pecuniary interests; that two Canadian Pacific Railway stockholders owned the Globe, and that the railway company was its master. He piled up epithets in fine protusion against the Globe, called it a "nickle-in-the-slot machine for monopolists," and declared he would not be surprised at anything the "hiringling" might say. The "British Columbia four" led the hearty applause, in which some members of the Opposition ranks joined.

The first motion in condemnation of the Ministry this session was proposed by Mr. Foster yesterday afternoon in an amendment to Fitzpatrick's motion for the second reading of the Franchise Bill. He rose to protest against the introduction of the least important part of the Government's programme, while the one measure for which the country is waiting is held back and postponed, viz., the Tariff Bill. Mr. Foster's arraignment of the Government was most severe, and the Grit uneasiness that followed was a sight to see. Three years ago Mr. Laurier denounced the Government for not bringing down the tariff measure as soon as the House met. Yet here was the Ministry which declared its intention of revolutionizing trade withholding the tariff for nine months. One session passed without anything being done, the meeting of the second session was three times postponed, and now after two weeks it was passed over in favor of a measure which would be idle on the statute books for three years to come.

Someone suggested "moments of weakness." To this Mr. Foster replied: "We are all liable to have them, but deliver me from a chronic weakness lasting months and years."

Mr. Foster then devoted an hour to rehearsing the vacillating conduct and contradictory declarations of the ministers—setting forth their conflicting declarations opposite each other amid almost continuous cheers on the Opposition side.

He moved that the consideration of the Franchise Bill be deferred until the Tariff Bill has been disposed of.

The amendment was not expected by the Government. Mr. Cameron (Huron) had arranged to make the second speech on the Government side and was primed to attack the present franchise law.

Mr. Clancey replied supporting the amendment after which the House adjourned.

When the House adjourns next Wednesday it will stand adjourned to the following Tuesday.
