

Then, one stormy day, the rugged pioneer threw a sack across his broad shoulders and started walking to the nearest grist-mill, often several miles away. The old mill was like the smithy of a later period, a place where the settlers gathered to discuss the latest events, in their respective communities, while they waited in turn while their grists were being turned into flour.

Often, a farmer would be absent from home for a whole week, passing the days in pleasant conversation, the nights in sleeping in the creaking old millhouse with a pillow of unground grain beneath his head.

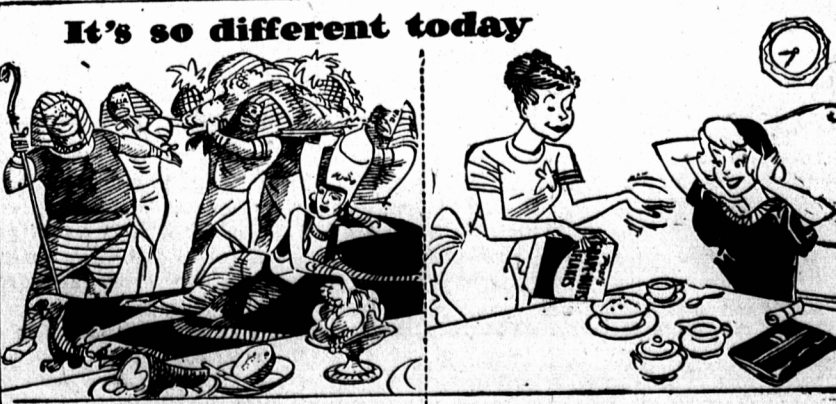
What uncounted hours of toil went into the making of that flour! How good it must have tasted to the entire family each of whom could proudly boast of having had a hand in its production!
