

Local and Other Items.

THE attention of the authorities is called to the nuisance at the head of Prince Street wharf.

It is stated that the Pope has submitted to Germany definite proposals for a compromise which should end the clerical controversy, but the Government is disinclined to accept.

CRICKET.—The return match, "Foreigners," versus "Natives," will be played on Saturday afternoon, the game to commence at the usual hour. A lively game is expected as the "Foreigners" have some strong additions to their team.

THE various companies of the active Militia, under command of Col. Beer, and headed by the Band of the 82nd battalion, paraded the principal streets of the city last night, making a fine display.

In consequence of the growth of the French and Russian armies, and in view of the increase of revenue by taxation, the German Government is considering the advisability of increasing the army, for which purpose it asks a perpetual grant from Parliament.

THE United States Charge d'Affairs at Berne explains that the recent vote in favor of the restoration of capital punishment in Switzerland does not represent the sentiment of the people. A question of State rights was involved in the recent ballot. To obtain a true test a vote should be taken by each canton separately.

WALLACE ROSS, the St. John sculler, has returned home from England. He speaks in high tones of British fair play. The *Sun* says: "There is no disguising the fact that Wallace Ross is to-day a better oarsman than he was when he set sail for England last November in the barque 'Arklow.'" English trainers may claim what measure of credit for this improvement they like; but the fact remains that they had the best material in the world to work on when they took hold of Ross, and that the result is largely due to his own common sense, coupled with an attentive study of what he saw and heard. We feel confident that great as have been the triumphs of our young sculler, he will yet win even more renowned victories.

Personals.

The *Ottawa Citizen* states that it is not unlikely that the Rt. Hon. Sir John Macdonald, Sir Charles Tupper and Sir Samuel L. Tilley will leave Canada for England in the course of a couple of weeks.

The St. John *Sun* understands that Sir S. L. Tilley will probably reach St. Andrews on Saturday (via Bangor), and St. John on Tuesday next.

Lord Loftus, recently appointed Governor of New South Wales, sailed from Liverpool on Saturday for New York to proceed to Australia via San Francisco.

The Duke of Edinburgh will succeed Admiral Phellimore, as Admiral Superintendent of Naval Reserves, at the end of the latter's term of office in November.

Shipbuilding on the Clyde.

The decline of the Clyde shipbuilding trade is exciting much uneasiness. How great the decline is may be shown very briefly from statistics collected by the *Glasgow Herald*. In 1874 the steam tonnage built on the Clyde amounted to 183,144 tons, the sailing tonnage to 69,166, or to 252,310 tons in all, being 44 per cent. of the steam tonnage built in the whole United Kingdom, and 39½ per cent. of the sailing tonnage, or 43 per cent. of the whole. Last year the Clyde turned out only 131,443 steam tons and 56,678 sailing tons; while the total tonnage built in the United Kingdom was 8 per cent. greater than in 1874.

Sunday.

In the debate in the House of Lords on the opening of museums on Sundays, the Marquis of Ripon explained that Sunday was not a fast but a feast, or, in the language of John Keble, "An Easter day in every week." While he admitted that, were he forced to choose between most stern and rigorous Sunday observance which ever was practised in Great Britain, and a Continental Sunday divided between business and horse racing, he would choose the first, he still held that it would be much more consistent with the due sanctity of the Sunday that a man should spend his afternoons in a museum, gallery or library, than that he should spend it alone in a public house, with all the evils of deterioration that must follow.
