TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Control of Egypt.
LONDON, May 25.
According to the Pall Mall Gazette, France asked that before the meeting of the proposed conference, England should consent to place Egypt under international control.
Earl Granville, Foreign Secretary of State, objected to this as long as British military occupation of Egypt should continue. At that, France asked that the duration of military occupation be limited and renewed the demand for immediate international control. Earl Granville in reply to this, named five years as the minimum for English occupation, and insisted in the post-ponement of the proposed international control until after the English had withdrawn from the country. But France steadfastly adhered to her service demand until at last Earl Granville offered to consent to the principal of nullible control provided it be requested. France accepted, caring little for the shadow but anxious for the substance. France is now trying to limit English occupation to three years.

Infernal Men and Machines.
LONDON, May 26.
Two men from Calais were arrested this morning at Charing Cross Railway Station. There luggage contained a quantity of explosives, together with what were supposed to be Infernal Machines. The chief inspector of explosives is making an examination of the suspicious articles. The men arrested declare that the objects were intended for perfectly legitimate purposes.

The Latest from Gen. Gordon.
LONDON, May 26.
Sir Henry Gordon said to-day that the latest news from Gen. Gordon was to the effect that he had no fears as to his personal safety. He could leave Khartoum by a safe route any day, but would not until better government in the eastern Sudan had been established, and the safety of the inhabitants from the rebels assured.

Egyptian Political Notes.
LONDON, May 26.
McBarrere, French Diplomatist Agent, has started for France.
Nubar Pacha, the Prime Minister, insists that no European shall be employed by the Ministry of Interior. Clifford Lloyd's nomination will, therefore, be dismissed.
The resignation of Abdel Kader Pasha, Minister of War, and Under-Secretary Nashau, are considered imminent.

Another Flood.
MADRID, May 26.
Floods in the southeastern provinces, about Murcia and Alicante, are becoming alarming. Whole towns have been cut off and the crops over a large extent of country have been rendered useless. Gen. Danas and sailors are conveying provisions to the destitute, and making every effort to rescue such of the inhabitants as are in danger. The inundation exceeds that of 1879.

Fatal Railway Accident.
ST. PETERSBURGH, May 26.
A serious railway accident has occurred near Bologne. Rails had been willfully loosened by unknown persons. This caused the Moscow express to leave the track and the engine, luggage van and three passenger cars were thrown down an embankment. One person was killed and several were injured.

European Politics.
PARIS, May 26.
The Voltairre publishes a letter from Brussels, which says Belgium and Holland have agreed to exclude German princes from succession to the Dutch throne. The same letter mentions an impending Dutch and Belgium customs union, and says that Princess Welholmeine, of Holland, has been betrothed to Prince Bandoning, Belgium.

Fleeing for their Lives.
TEXAS, May 25.
Trinity River is now a mile and a half wide at the bridge. Families are forced to flee for their lives. There has been a distressing destruction of crops, stock, and improvements. The worst is yet to come.

Funeral of a Dynamiter.
DUBLIN, May 26.
The remains of Dennis Beasy, the dynamiter, who died a week ago in Chatham prison, were buried yesterday at Bandome. There was a large attendance at the funeral.

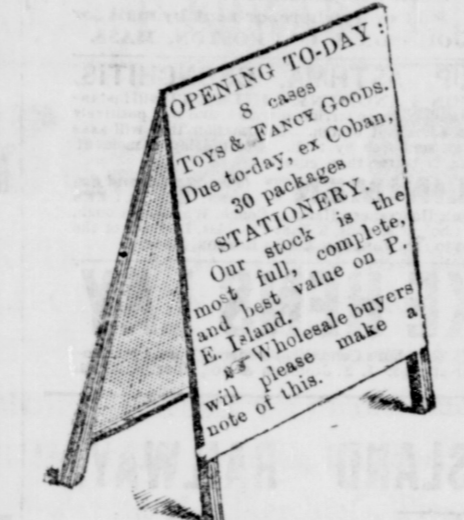

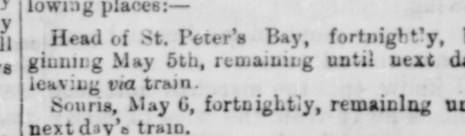
