Statistics.

TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS were, during the last session of Parliament, voted for the collection of vital and other statistics.

Dr. Taylor of this city, and several other leading physicians in the Maritime Provinces have, we learn, received communications on the subject.

Thanks to the Dominion Government, and especially to the Minister of Agriculture, a movement has at last been made towards supplying the want; and it is gratifying to know that the movement is being helped forward by the leading men of Montreal, Toronto, and other large cities.

We trust that our City Board of Health, the City Council and the Local Government will, jointly or separately, take measures to secure a good representation.

The Summerside Journal understands that Hon. Alexander Laird has decided not to allow himself to be put in nomination for the Council. This is significant. What will the Council do now?

DR. OLIVER WENDALL HOLMES, has tendered his resignation as Parkman Professor of Anatomy to Harvard University, Boston. He held the office thirty-five years. Hereafter Dr. Holmes will give his attention to literary pursuits only.

The debt of \$800,000, which has been pressing heavily on the Roman Catholic diocese of Montreal for many years, and most of which was incurred by building churches, has been entirely cleared off by contributions and sales of property.

A CHILD of Mr. James McQuaid, of Cardigan, met a horrible death a few days ago. While in the field with her parents, her clothing accidentally took fire, and she received injuries from which she died in less than three hours. OLIVER MOWAT, Premier of Ontario, is having a hard time of it. He was visited on a few days ago by a deputation of Episcopalians, Presbyterians, and Methodist ministers, who urged upon him the use of the Bible in Public Schools. No doubt the subject has Mr. Mowat's sympathy but with Archbishop Lynch at his side it will not do at present to give the matter much consideration.

The Gromoff lumber yard, the largest in Europe, has been burned. It is situated on the banks of the Neva, nearly at the end of the Neusky Prospekt. The wind, fortunately, localized the conflagration, which might have enveloped the whole neighborhood. There were in the woodyard 3,000,000 planks and 200,000 beams. The yard covers a superficial space of more than a million square yards. The value of the contents is estimated at \$1,000,000, of which at this time one-half is destroyed, and the fire is still raging.

ST. PATRICK'S HALL was fairly well filled last evening to hear Rev. Dr. O'Brien lecture on the "Ruins of Pompeii and Herculaneum." The discourse consisted of a review, in an easy, conversational style, of the Lecturer's own experiences in visiting these memorable places. An account was given of the work of excavation that is now going on, with descriptions of the works of art found among the ruins, and showing, how in many instances, they surpass the *chef d'oeuvre* of our own civilization. The rev. doctor touched, in a humorous way, on many incidents in his travel to and about Naples, interspersing his discourse with many good passages, embodying generally some crisp philosophic truth—an art in which the learned doctor is well skilled, and which tends to make his lectures, on many subjects, popular and instructive.
