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Y's Men's Club Business Meeting

—Last evening, the Summerside Y's Men's Club met at the Green Street Y. Centre for their regular weekly meeting which was devoted entirely to business. Y's George Meikle announced that a ladies grant could be held on February 10th with arrangements and program to be made by the Busy Bee. Time of the meeting was set for 7 p. m.

The first of three recommendations from the executive advocated that the Y Centre building be extended. A lengthy discussion on this item followed, in which the pressing need for larger meeting quarters for the Scout troops and Cub packs sponsored by the Y's Men was pointed out.

At the present time the Y's Men are sponsoring four Scout troops and four Cub packs and the Y Centre is being used every week day night except Saturday. The club approved this recommendation with the amendment that the property committee should bring in a plan and estimate for the work necessary. The second recommendation suggested that the club establish a building extension fund following approval of the first recommendation. It was stated that the Y's Menettes had offered their support of such a fund. A third recommendation was that the club hold a hat hanger and bottle collection drive. Y's Harold Rodd, chairman of the membership committee, said that the club now has 50 members—two members having resigned due to pressure of business, and two having been transferred. Y's Jock Hopkirk reported for the money-saving committee telling the club that \$840.00 had been made on the various projects and dates which did not include money from the booster plates now being sold by the club. Y's Roy Boates, co-chairman of this year's radio auction with Y's Parker Crockett, stated that twelve volunteers had worked on the letter listings Sunday afternoon and this work was now complete. He announced that Y's George Clark was in charge of having the Christmas entertainments of the Ladies' Aid, also included a number of money-raising projects and the expenditure of proceeds on church and parsonage. During the summer months a committee from the Aid arranges flowers in the church for Sunday services.

Both Guild and Ladies' Aid, assisted by other members of the pastoral charge, participated in serving meals at the Exhibition. Proceeds went to the parsonage fund. Both organizations took part in the Christmas entertainments of the Men's Association.

Earle Atkinson reported a year of useful activity by the Men's Association with its 56 members. Projects included name boards for Alberton and Cascumpec churches, organization of a men's choir, sponsoring the Mount Allison campaign, giving white gifts, sponsoring an interdenominational Good Friday service, securing Dr. W. T. R. Flemington as speaker for a special service, entertaining the ladies at supper, providing ushers for church services, care of church grounds, putting in a culvert at the parsonage, assisting in organizing men's associations at Bideford and O'Leary and conducting of evening worship on Laymen's Sunday. The Young People's Union has a membership of eleven.

Following election of retiring members the Board of Stewards is composed as follows: Messrs. Roy Leard; Cedric Hunter; Percy Hardy; Walter Wells; Reginald Travers; Earl Atkinson; Eric Corbett; Norman Hardin and Dr. O. H. Phillips.

Mrs. James Hodgson was elected treasurer and Miss Mabel Fielding, auditor. Votes of thanks were extended to the minister and his wife, to the organist, Miss Annie Leard, and the choir leader, Mr. C. R. Leard, for their good work.

The meeting closed with prayer and the benediction by the minister.

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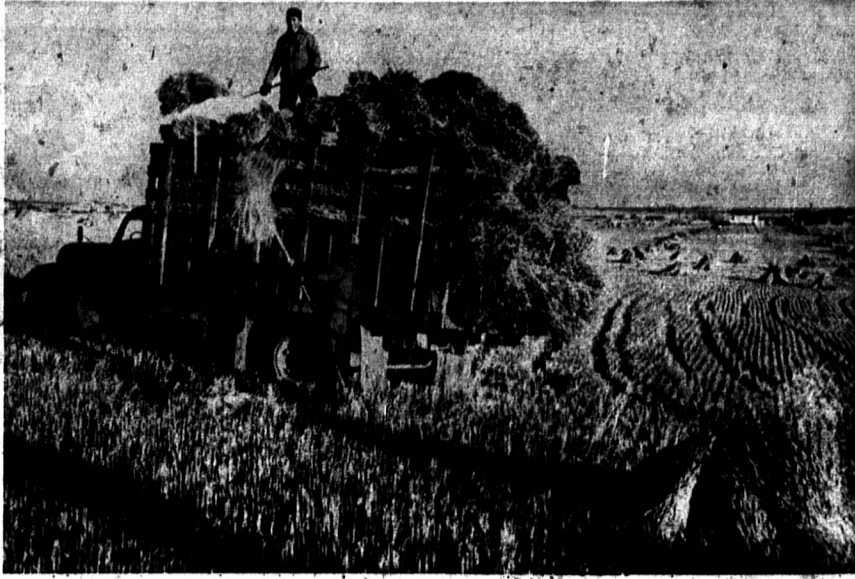
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Bringing In The Sheaves—In January
