Montague Board Of Trade Bi-Monthly Meeting Held

"The regular bi-monthly meeting of the Montague Board of Trade was held last evening in the town hall, with the president, Mr. James Cudmore, presiding. Two visitors were present, Mr. Henry MacWilliams, president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade and Mr. Ignatius MacDonald, a member of the board.

In his opening remarks, Mr. MacWilliams noted the number of worthwhile projects the Montague board has undertaken and complimented the members on their initiative.

Mr. MacWilliams stated that the main purpose of his presence at the meeting was to bring to the attention of the Montague board the national convention of Canada's Junior Chambers of Commerce being held in Halifax late in June. He urged the Montague members to attend this convention if they possible could, stating that a great deal of valuable information can be learned from a convention of this kind, and further, that this is the first time that a national convention has been held anywhere in the Maritimes and will very likely be the last chance that P.E.I. board members will get to conveniently attend a national convention for a very long time.

He mentioned that there will be about 400 delegates representing various boards from all over Canada in attendance and also that there will be automatic translating equipment at the disposal of the regional representatives who are not bi-lingual.

Mr. MacWilliams also stated that the P. E. I. Junior Boards will sponsor a day at the convention. A number of attractions will be presented including a lobster dinner and an island orchestra, to

In Memoriam Conservative Party Names Candidates In 4th Queens

J. WILLIAM BRENNAN. The death occurred at his home in Souris on March 7th last of J. William Brennan in his 80th year. The late Mr. Brennan was born in Souris and was a lifelong and respected resident of that town. For twenty-nine years he held a position as accountant with the firm of J. J. Hughes Co. Ltd. Some years subsequent to his retirement with the company he was appointed local vendor, a position which he very competently filled until failing health forced his retirement in 1945.

While the late Mr. Brennan's chief interests centered around his family, his home and his work, he always found time to lend assistance to all worthwhile civic projects. He served for several years as a member of the Town Council and as Mayor of the town of Souris a short time after its incorporation. He was a talented member of the Souris Citizens' Band and served as a Lieutenant with the 4th Regiment of the Royal Canadian Artillery. At all times a staunch supporter of his church, he served for twenty-nine years as a member of the board of elders of St. Mary's Church, Souris.

He was predeceased by his wife in 1946 and by one son, Jack in 1952. Surviving are a sister, Bessie of Malden, Mass.; two daughters Matilda and Margaret (Mrs. Hicks) both of Malden; and two sons, William, at present an inspector of schools in North Battleford, Sask., and James at home.

His largely attended funeral on March 9th bore silent testimony to the esteem in which the late Mr. Brennan was held by his fellow citizens. The High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by his pastor, Rt. Rev. Monsignor J. A. Murphy. Services at the grave were conducted by Rev. E. B. Steele. The pall bearers were: His Worship Mayor Bruce L. Stewart; Kenneth A. Fraser, A. W. Wright, J. Arthur Peters, John R. McLean and Melvin J. McQuaid.

The funeral will be held on Wednesday afternoon from Zion Church at 2.00 p. m.

Left to mourn her loss is her husband, who is manager of F. W. Woolworth's in Truro, and three girls ages 8-13. They are Elizabeth, Rosamund and Becky. Besides her parents, four sisters and four brothers survive. They are Gladys, in Ottawa; Mrs. A. W. Matheson, Mrs. Gordon Stedman, City; Mrs. William Brehaut, Lower Whitehead, Mass.; Robert and Arthur, Charlottetown; Byron in Calgary and Kenneth in Ajax, Ontario.

Mr. Alex MacPherson of Grandview and Mr. Wellington MacNeill of Southport were nominated by the Conservative party to contest the Fourth District of Queen's at the forthcoming Provincial election, at a convention held at Eidon Hall last night.

Mr. MacPherson's nomination for councillor was moved by Montague MacDonald of Lyndale and seconded by Frank MacDonald of Belfast. Mr. MacNeill's nomination for assemblyman was moved by Gay Judson of Alexandria and seconded by George Lawton of Pownal. The name of Lloyd Martin, Cherry Valley, was brought

before the convention by John MacDougald, but Mr. Martin declined the nomination. The meeting which was largely attended was addressed by the Party Leader, Mr. R. R. Bell, Q.C. Other speakers included Walter MacKenzie, candidate for the First District of Queen's; Bennett Carr, secretary for the Queen's County Association; George MacLean, Lewis; Montague MacDonald, J. Russell Driscoll, candidate for the Third District of Queen's and Leo Praught of Cherry Valley.

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Former Belfast Man Dies In Sydney, N. S.

The death of John MacKeigan occurred suddenly on April 5 at Sydney, N.S. in his 69th year. He was born at Belfast, P.E.I., son of the late Murdoch and Catherine (Buchanan) MacKeigan. A few years later the family moved to Montague where they resided until leaving in 1912. During the First World War the deceased served four years with the Canadian Army.
