**Expanding Potato Market Is Seen In Newfoundland**

KENSINGTON — Reid Sangster, provincial marketing director, was guest speaker at the Kensington Area Board of Trade general meeting recently and was introduced by Lloyd Lockery, program committee chairman.

Giving a Prince County re-sources survey report, Mr. Sangster briefly outlined his recent trip to Newfoundland where he was extremely impressed with recent advances and introduced by Lloyd Lockery, program committee chairman.

Mr. Sangster suggested that the market year looks good with regard to potatoes "if shipments are evenly maintained". Mr. Sangster suggested to the meeting that the ARDA program will do much for agriculture in the province and looks forward to continuing increasing development. "The thing that we need most is industry", the speaker told the board of trade. He spoke favorably of the Kensington area, saying that it has one of the greatest traffic potentials in the province, giving the area a good chance for expansion in all fields. Although there are numerous possibilities for the area, the ideas should originate in the minds of the people themselves, he said. "Negative thinking," stated Mr. Sangster, "is the greatest drawback with which most areas have to contend".

The meeting was held in the Kensington Regional High School and the president, Murray MacEwen, presided. The board agreed to request continuation of inspection of produce at Seomun Bros. Frozen Food plant. This was done by farm groups. Utilization of the Winter Works program is under study by the board.

A discussion on arrangements to assist in the welfare benefits for needy families, referred to the matter being turned over to the public affairs committee under the chairmanship of E. C. Moore. Other business included getting sidewalks on the Margate Road as far as the Kensington Regional High School by contacting the department of highways.

**1,000 Maritime Bulls Are Shipped To Cuba**

Canadian Press Correspondent MONCTON (CP) — A program of selling young Holstein bulls to Cuba is in full swing in the Maritime provinces. During the last six months more than 1,000 animals from the area have been shipped south from the port of Saint John, N.B. Last week one of the largest shipments — 800 bulls — was loaded on the Cuban freighter Combatte de Palmatochea. Except for one hitch many Maritime farmers would probably embark on an active production program for this ready market. The hitch is that as yet there has been no definite word on how long the Cubans will be willing to purchase the bulls, to be used as breeding stock.

The whole affair began less than a year ago when Cuban agriculture officials decided to enlarge their buying territory. Previously, they had bought bulls from Ontario and Quebec farmers. A number of animals still come from these provinces but today most efforts are being concentrated in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

At that time there was talk that the program could continue for five years. However, in recent months the Cubans have not given any indication as to when the project might end.

**PLAN FRENCH CLASS**

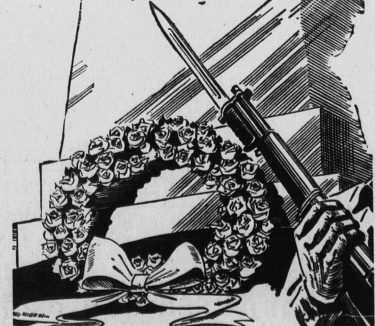
