PC Candidate In First Kings Has Fine Record

A fine record of achievement in the farming industry and in public affairs, stamps Peter J. MacAulay as "the ideal" type of man to represent First Kings in the government of this province.

Peter MacAulay and Keith MacKenzie will carry the banner of Premier Walter Shaw's Progressive Conservative party in next Monday's all-important deferred election in First Kings.

After serving with the Royal Canadian Air Force in World War Two, Peter MacAulay returned to the Souris area to establish his own farm. He has worked hard at his operation for 30 years and has the satisfaction of having seen his enterprise develop to the point where he now has an excellent 50-head herd of dairy cattle, and is regarded as one of the more prominent growers of seed potatoes in the eastern part of the province.

But Peter MacAulay's activities have not been confined to his farm alone. He is a director of the Eastern Kings Arena Association, a director of the P.E.I. Potato Producers' Association, a director of Souris Exhibition Association, a member of the Souris Board of Trade, and a member of the Canadian Legion.

It was because of his unqualified success in the farming industry — where he made his own way, and made it well — coupled with a fine record of public service, where his concern for community affairs was displayed, that the Progressive Conservative party nominated Peter MacAulay to seek election in First Kings.

Mr. MacAulay was born at Souris Line Road in February, 1918, son of Mrs. Frank MacAulay and the late Frank MacAulay. His father was a noted swine breeder and his herd was a regular feature at many Maritime fairs over the years.

Peter is married to the former Bertha MacKinnon, St. Peter's, and they have six children: Garth, 15; Paul, 15; Ann Marie, 12; Ronnie, 11; Colin, 8; and Marion, 4 years old.

With his wide experience in basic Island industry, his intimate knowledge of his district, his voluntary contributions to community affairs, and his record of success in his private life, Peter J. MacAulay is the ideal candidate for a P.E.I. constituency.

during debate on the Canada Assistance Plan.

"This is a sector of our population whose capacity for earning is either completely gone or painfully diminished," Mr. Macquarrie noted. "These are people who are living through a period of rapidly rising living costs and who face additional costs of medicine, nursing, special care and transportation."

He said that no one could decently or comfortably live on \$75 a month and no one could or would suggest that it was a proper measure of financial assistance. He said the Conservative party had consistently argued that the pension should be raised to \$100 and any astute or sensible government would have done this before now.

MEANS TEST

Mr. Macquarrie said he has always been concerned about a means test and the fact it was now called a needs test did not alter the situation. He said a needs test was established by a most "indignant" scrutiny into every detail of a person's life as far as his finances were concerned.

"Not only must one be poor, one must prove that he is poor to some official of the state. I think this is an indignity to be forced upon the senior citizens of this country."

Mr. Macquarrie declared: "Another thing that concerns me is the possibility of regional variation because of the suggestion an old person in Toronto needs more than an old person in Prince Edward Island."

He said that the government of Prince Edward Island under Premier Walter Shaw was providing \$100 a month to all its older citizens and not only for those who come forward to document their poverty. The P.E.I. government was prepared to bear the full load of pensions without a means test.

Health Minister Allan MacEachen interrupted to say that P.E.I. proposes to apply a means test and has requested federal cooperation under the Canada Assistance Plan to do that. But Mr. Macquarrie disagreed and said that the extra \$25 a month would be paid without a test. He said the plan had no device whereby the Dominion government would assist P.E.I. in the payment to those who were not able to document their poverty.

"In my view it is the Dominion government which should be paying all the pension and they might well emulate Premier Shaw instead of criticizing him," Mr. Macquarrie said.

Corridor Road Group Holds Meeting Here

Representatives from Maine, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island who compose the International Atlantic Corridor Road Committee, promoting the shortest route across Maine connecting Quebec with the Maritime Provinces attended luncheon sponsored by the city Board of Trade on Saturday. Members from Quebec were unable to attend.

The project will bring a 165-mile stretch of highway connecting McAdam, N.B. with L.A.C. Megantic, P.Q. up to the standard of the two lane Trans-Canada Highway. Improvements and by-passes on Route 6 through the state of Maine will shorten the distance to central Canada by 150 - 200 miles.

The premiers of the three Maritime Provinces and the Governor of the State of Maine have endorsed the proposed Corridor route which is expected to cost over \$25,000,000 before final construction in Maine, N.B. and Quebec could be completed.

Guests at the luncheon were Mayor Walter Cox, Ken MacKenzie, Charlottetown, Director of Transportation for P.E.I., and A. J. Gallant, P.E.I. Registrar of Motor Vehicles.

Halifax Station Plans TV Outlet Near Amherst

HALIFAX (Special) — The recommendations of the government white paper on broadcasting are immensely satisfying says the president of C.I.C.H. Limited of Halifax, Finlay MacDonald. Mr. MacDonald thinks the "freeze is off."

C.I.C.H. television announce their immediate intention to proceed with their deferred application to provide alternative television service to the central Maritime area, using channel 8 on maximum power at a site near Amherst, N.S. If approved this rebroadcasting station would provide CTV network coverage to Prince Edward Island and Northern Nova Scotia.

C.I.C.H. vice president of engineering John Jay, said that the application would likely be heard by the board of broadcasting governors at their November 15 public hearing in Ottawa and that if approved, service can be expected by mid-spring, and in colour. Mr. Jay said that service is also planned for other areas of Nova Scotia but a reallocation of certain channels will have to be effected before all applications could be processed.

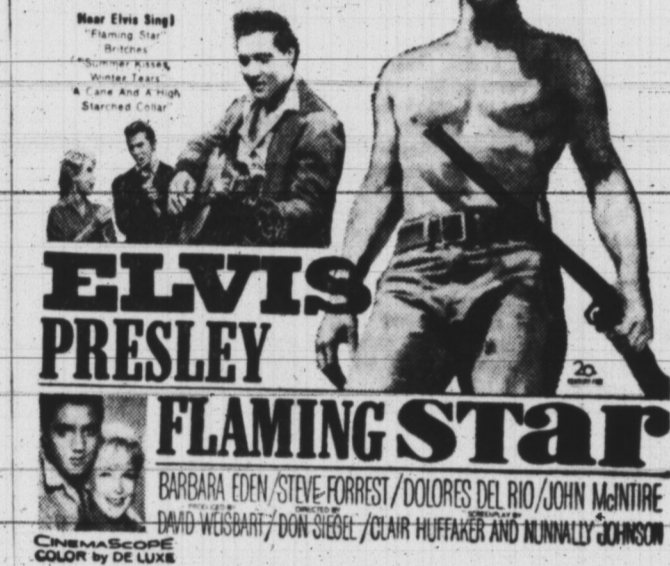

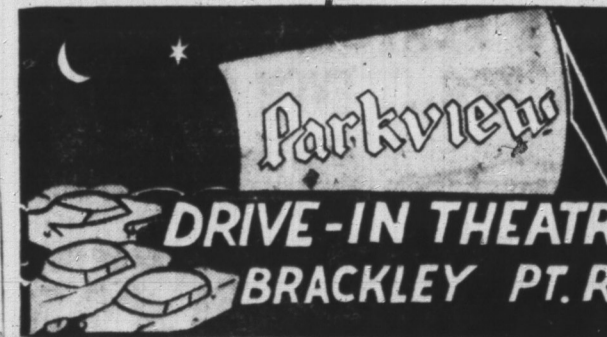
