

New British Trade Plan Causes Excitement, Fear

LONDON (CP)—Britain's plan for tightening trade links between the Commonwealth and Europe, outlined in Washington during the weekend by chancellor of the exchequer Harold Macmillan, is arousing excited comment in London.

One aspect of reaction among Commonwealth countries is a reported Canadian fear that Macmillan's proposed free-trade plan will tend to divide the world even more sharply into dollar and non-dollar areas. All Canada's energies since the Second World War have been devoted to avoiding such a split.

The Observer, an independent newspaper, refers to these Canadian fears and adds:

"Canada, which does not relish the prospect of being forced into even closer trade relations with the United States, is very worried about this. . . . The British proposal, but this independent newspaper adds that the obstacles are 'many, various and formidable.' Other commentators wonder how the idea of Commonwealth association with a European free trade zone can be harmonized with Commonwealth preferential tariffs and other special Commonwealth trading ties.

To some extent, Macmillan's far-reaching project — which the chancellor emphasized in a tentative stage—took London by surprise. The new move has been kept fairly secret, although there have been hints to the government's thinking.

1 1/2 cups brown sugar
2 eggs well beaten
2 squares melted chocolate
3 tbsp. milk
