

The Missouri Tornado.

St. Louis, April 20. Latest reports from the track of the storm of Sunday evening, state that other towns and cities were struck by the tempest, and many buildings wrecked. From Iowa, Illinois, and Indiana there comes reports of a similar visitation, causing immense destruction of property.

CHICAGO, Ill., April 20. Specials from various parts show the storm of Sunday was very general and disastrous throughout Illinois. At Decatur trees were uprooted, barns blown down, and cellars filled with water. At Warren the cyclone did thousand of dollars damage; several houses were blown down. Miles of fences and all the bridges are gone. At Winona the storm was the severest for years, trees and fences were thrown down and much property destroyed. No one was seriously injured. The mercury fell 54 degrees in ten hours.

Two cyclones passed over Davis County, Iowa; one passed through the town of Stiles, 12 miles south of Bloomfield, unroofing houses and barns, destroying out-buildings and prostrating fences and orchards; it left a path of destruction 20 miles long, varying from 60 to 300 yards wide, and was accompanied by terrific thunder, lightning, heavy hail and great floods of rain.

The other passed four miles north of Bloomfield; its track was marked with the same scenes of destruction. The loss of property is very great. The damage at Watash, Ind., occasioned by the storm is estimated at \$6,000. A report says Christian people awoke and prepared for death.

LATER.

St. Louis, Midnight, April 20.

A despatch from Marshfield says that 300 people arrived there from Springfield and Lebanon and are caring for the wounded.

The loss at Marshfield is estimated \$350,000 to 400,000. Every business house in the place is in ruins and stocks destroyed except two. Of the 800 inhabitants of Marshfield, seven eighths are without houses, clothing, food or means to procure them. The destitution and suffering is terrible.

A child was found at Marshfield lodged in the crotch of a tree, thirty feet above ground, but slightly hurt. Four hundred dollars were raised to-day at Ralla for the sufferers at Marshfield.
