

Island to Island: A Newfie's Perspective



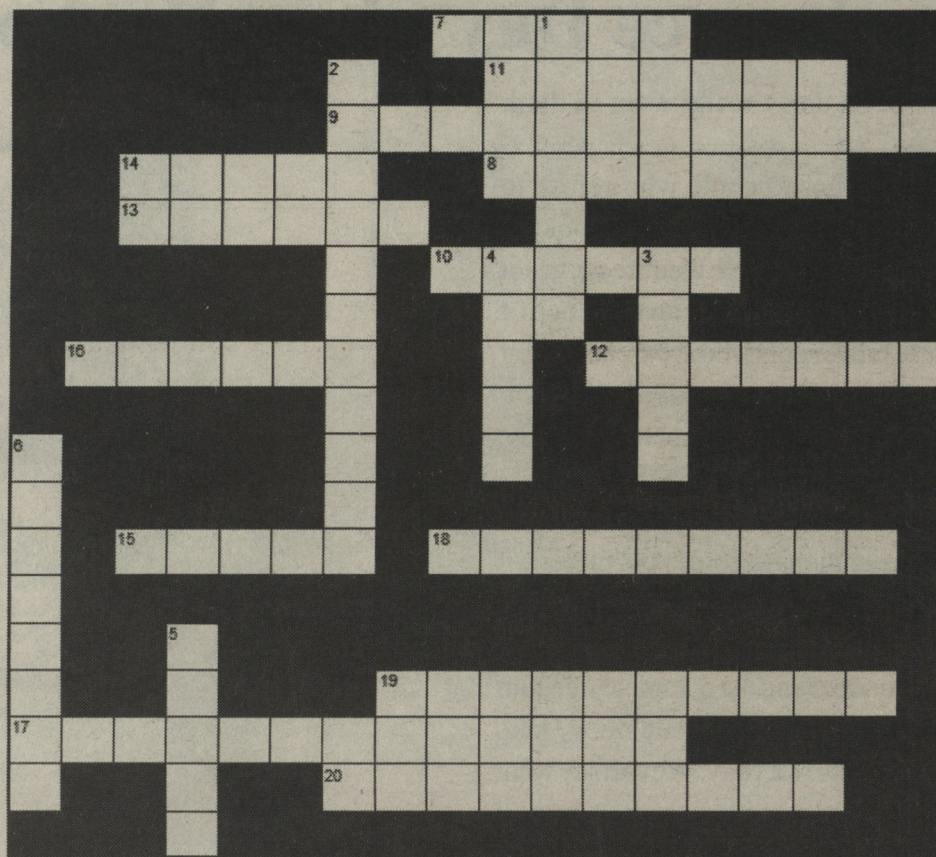
