Courses Being Held

Short courses in cooking and sewing are being sponsored by the Women's Institute, and began on Tuesday, July 29th, and will finish Friday, August 1st. These courses are instructed by Miss Mary Robin, Supervisor of the P. E. I. Women's Institute, Mrs. Ralph Manning, assistant Supervisor, and Miss Betty Daniels who is studying Home Economics at Acadia University.

The courses being held at the Vocational School for the Junior Club members to help prepare them for the Dominion Competition held at the Royal Winter Fair, in Toronto. A full and interesting program is scheduled for each day which begins at 9 a.m. and continues until approximately 9 p.m. The morning is mostly devoted to the practical side of sewing and cooking, and during the afternoons, talks, demonstrations, and work projects are held. Talks are being given on the 4-H Clubs by Mr. Stewart Wright, president of the Canadian Council of 4-H Clubs; on the Clothing Club Project for the Royal Winter Fair by Miss Helen Wright and Nita Thompson of Lower Magague; on the significance of Junior Club Work in P. E. I. and Canada by Mr. Morris Deacon, and on Food Club Projects for the Royal Winter Fair by Miss E. Holmes who attended the Royal Winter Fair last year.

There is a good representation of Junior Club members enrolled and this is the third year that the courses have been undertaken.
