TOMORROW'S DINNER (About 1 hr.) Tomato Soup (Canned) Sour Cream-Chives Topping Casserole of Frozen Stuffed Fish Fillets in Shrimp Sauce Green Peas and Cooked Celery Swedish Rhubarb Mold with Half-Thawed Frozen Strawberries Coffee Tea Milk

Convenience foods needed: Canned condensed tomato soup, frozen or freeze-dried herbed stuffing mix, frozen condensed cream of shrimp soup, frozen green peas, and frozen strawberries.

Measurements level: recipes for 6

CASSEROLE OF FROZEN STUFFED FISH FILLETS IN SHRIMP SAUCE 1/2 c. butter or margarine 1/2 c. fine-chopped onion 2 c. pkg. herbed stuffing mix 2-3 c. boiling water 2 (1 lb.) pkg. frozen haddock or cod fillets, thawed 1/2 tsp. salt 1 tsp. pepper 1 (10 oz.) can frozen condensed cream of shrimp soup 1/2 c. milk 1 tsp. chopped parsley In medium saucepan, melt

butter; pour off and reserve 3 tbsp. Sauté onion in remaining butter until tender. Remove from heat. Stir in stuffing mix and 2 water. Arrange stuffing in center of a buttered shallow baking dish (13" x 9" x 2"). Place blocks of fish fillets on top. Brush with 3 tbsp. of the reserved melted butter. Dust with salt and pepper. Bake 30 to 40 min. in hot oven (400 degrees F.) or until fish flakes when tested with fork. Meanwhile, in saucepan, combine soup, milk, and parsley. Heat; stir often. To serve, pour sauce over the fish.

SWEDISH RHUBARB MOLD (Make in advance) 1/2 c. cornstarch 1/4 tsp. salt 1 c. sugar 1 c. stewed rhubarb pulp 1 c. stewed rhubarb juice 1 c. boiling water 2 tsp. lemon juice 2 egg whites, refrigerated at least 2 hrs. Unmold in dessert dishes; serve with half-thawed

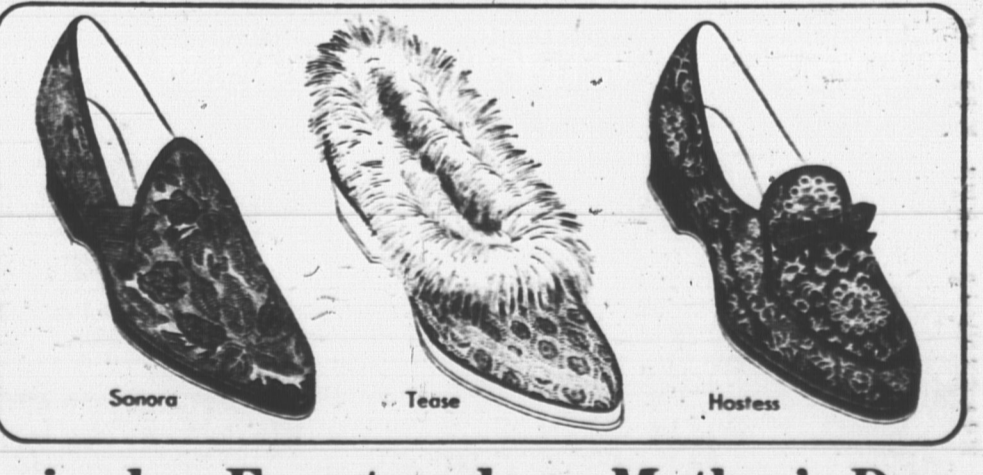
