

Junior Abbies Defeat Intermediates 7-4 For 3-Way Tie In Series

The Charlottetown Junior Abbies scored three unearned runs in the top of the seventh inning yesterday evening to defeat the Intermediate Abbies 7-4 and force a three-way tie in the round-robin series for the City baseball title.

As a result of the game played on Memorial Field, the Juniors, intermediates and M.C.A. now have two points with each team having a win and a loss. Each team now meets the other team once before the series is completed.

Fifteen-year-old "Duck" MacLeod left his shortstop position to take over hurling duties and the young baseball prodigy stopped the intermediates cold on five hits, four of them singles.

MacLeod had smooth sailing for the first five innings but in the sixth he encountered his first serious trouble. A single, double, two infield errors and a fly ball enabled the intermediates to come up with three runs and deadlock the game at four-all.

Right-hander Charlie Ryan, making his first appearance on a local diamond in more than weeks struck out the first two juniors in the seventh and appeared to be in the clear. An infield error on Charlie Kennedy's grounder and a walk to pitcher MacLeod however soon changed the complexion of the game.

Then Joe Coyle caught a low roundhouse and drilled it into right field to score Kennedy with the winning run. Another infield error on Cliff Ready's grounder allowed two more juniors to score before Ryan struck out the last batter to retire the side.

MacLeod got the first two intermediates in the last of the seventh but a single by "Buck" Whitlock started off another rally. Merlin MacKenzie came through with another single and Charlie Ryan walked to load the bases. Cliff Ready snuffed out the rally by grabbing Maurice Williams' grounder and stepping on first base.

The loss was a tough one for Charlie Ryan who entered the game in the fifth to relieve starter Merlin MacKenzie. In the three innings he worked, Ryan struck out five and gave up only one hit.

MacKenzie, who turned in a brilliant performance last Friday evening, was not in his usual form. He was touched for seven hits in four innings including triples by Forbes Kennedy and Don MacLeod. MacLeod showed a good fastball and hook. He struck out eleven men in the seven inning game and walked three.

"Buck" Whitlock led all batters with three singles in four trips to the plate. Forbes Kennedy led the juniors with two hits in four trips. Cliff Ready and "Buck" Whitlock pulled off the best fielding plays. Ready made a brilliant stab of Williams' hot grounder in the

fourth while Whitlock raced over to the right of second base to rob "Red" MacFayden of a hit in the fourth. Charlie Ryan engineered the only double play of the game when he caught Coyle's line drive and got "Duck" MacLeod off base.

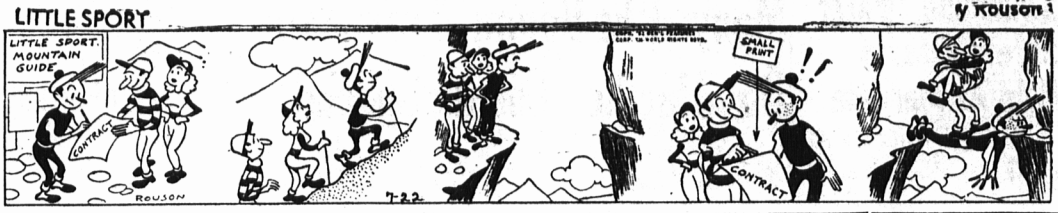

US Takes Over Team Lead At The Olympics

By JACK SULLIVAN HELSINKI, July 21—(CP)—The United States captured four of five track and field finals today and swept into the team lead in the Olympic Games over Russia.

It was a big day for the Americans who took a crack at Olympic records and also came up with a grand-slam triple in the shot put. But it was Lindy Remigio, a New Yorker, who stole the show by winning the blue ribbon 100-metre sprint. Camears—and not split-second watches—had to separate the runners in a sensational finish.

The U.S. point total in the unofficial team standings shot up to 72. Russia, without a winner at Olympic Stadium today, dropped to second place with 40 points. Czechoslovakia was third with 15, followed by Britain with 14 and Italy with 11.

Perry O'Brien, a big Californian led two teammates—Darrow Hooper and Jim Fuchs—in a clean sweep of medal duty in the shot put. He won the Olympic medal and made four hits in six trips.
