TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The following telegrams were received yesterday too late for insertion except in a small part of our regular edition:

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

PARIS, Feb. 2.—A despatch to the Havas News Agency from Cairo confirms the report cabled the Associated Press on Jan 31st that a rebellion had occurred among the Soudanese troops in Khar-toum.

It says there is much anxiety here. There has been a number of grave incidents, notably, the growing discontent in the Egyptian army which has attained to a mutiny in two Soudanese battalions.

The Government has sent Colonel Wingate to parley with them.

The army complains of bad treatment and the secret despatch of Egyptian troops in South Africa.

It appears certain that ten maxims and a large assignment of saddles have gone to Durban, and a number of English officers and civil functionaries have obtained an unlimited furlough to go to South Africa which is believed to be a breach of Egypt's neutrality.

The Government is alarmed at the attitude of the black troops and has asked the Khedive to intervene.

The latter has sent a letter urging obedience, but anxiety nevertheless continues.

Egypt is almost denuded of European troops.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—Sensational rumors are current that the Militia Ballot Act will be put in force on Feb. 14th and that General Lord Roberts has cabled for 90,000 additional men, which, it is said, the government has promised to give him, sending 50,000 militia and volunteers and 40,000 militia reserve.

It is also said that volunteers will be mobilized forthwith. It is even asserted today that the cabinet has specially dealt with these matters.

The Militia Ballot Act makes every unmarried man between 18 and 30 years of age liable to serve five years.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

London Leader: Contracts have been placed in Sheffield and Birmingham for 170,000 table-spoons for the army.

Toronto Star: Under the statute-labor system in Ontario, the farmer mends the roads for two days, and darns them all the rest of the year.

London, Ont., Advertiser: General Roberts is 67 years of age, and General Joubert 68. There is no suggestion here of a dead line in the army.

London, Eng. Globe: When Lord Kitchener was wishing a happy Christmas to the sailors, in accordance with shipboard custom, one of the men came up and said plaintively, "You will pull Kruger's whiskers for me, won't you?" And the General replied that he would do his best—to beard the president.

Yarmouth Times: In 1896 the Liberal candidate in Lotbiniere, Mr. Rinfret, who who is now inspector of Inland revenues in Quebec, had a majority of 400. On Thursday the government candidate was defeated by 164. Quite a turn over, wasn't it.

Yarmouth Times: Spion Kop has been abandoned, but neither hope nor Lady-smith. Don't give vent to pessimism or tolerate croakers.

St. Louis Republic: It must be acknowledged that the bearing of England's colonies in the existing crisis has been of a loyal character which eloquently testifies to their genuine union with the mother country.

Montreal Gazette: There is something of a parallel between Lucknow and Lady-smith. Lucknow, like Lady-smith, contained a British garrison, holding out while a relieving expedition made its way through the enemy. Lucknow was asked to hold out for eighteen days and did hold out for eighty-seven. Lady-smith may also do better than is expected.

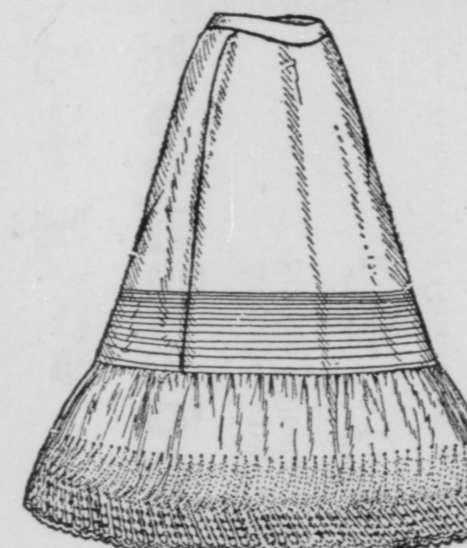
