LOCATE THE LINE.

While Superintendent Sharp was sent out to secure rights of way, before the section advertised was legally located, and about six months before the land could by any possibility be required, there is no hurry in fixing the location, or calling for tenders beyond the ten miles. The ten mile section stops exactly where the loop lines begin. To go further would show the Government's hand regarding the rival routes. Therefore a full stop is made.

But while the surveys are stopped at that point, the work of humbugging the people who are interested in one route or the other goes on apace. It is said that Sir Louis gave his knightly word, separately, to the advocates of both routes, that each party would have its views adopted. To stop all this humbug and deception why not legally locate the line beyond the controverted points. The word of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries is very uncertain ground to rest upon, particularly when it is a word of promise to both sides.

The location can only be made by a final survey, and the submission of exact plans to the Governor General in Council who, thereupon, authorizes an order in Council, approving of the survey and adopting the plans. Any pretended location of the railway in any other way is a sham, a delusion and a snare.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Now we have a milk combine,—although the Liberals went in to abolish and prevent combines!

—A new road—not at all needed—to extend from Alexandria Church to Lot 43 Road, is, just now, under commission, two of the commissioners being Charles McMillan, Esq., of Albert Plains and William Craine, Esq., of Cherry Valley, both of whom are known to have expressed themselves as highly dissatisfied with the conduct of the government. We refuse to believe that these gentlemen will be influenced by the bribe put in their way by the corruptionists, and shall await with interest the returns of the election in that regard.

—The Patriot says that Premier Farquharson has challenged Messrs A. A. McLean and Alex. Martin at several meetings to prove one single corrupt act on the part of the present government. This "bluff" which Premier Farquharson thinks is excellent play in the Patriot has no right in Belfast and Murray Harbor. To his teeth his government has been charged with corruption right and left and the proofs were at hand in every case. The Bolger Road business is only one of hundreds; and yet it is sufficient to convict the government and their candidate of barefaced attempts at corruption.

—The Merchant's Bank of Prince Edward Island is extending its lines everywhere. In the summer a branch was opened at Alberton, which is doing a big business in that enterprising quarter of the province, under the much esteemed manager, Mr. Cecil Stewart. Now a new branch is opening at Summerside which will, no doubt, get a large share of the banking business of that town.—Mr. Frank McMillan is in charge. It is pleasing to see our own institutions expand and flourish. When Premier Farquharson, defeated for the directorate, withdrew the Provincial accounts from the Merchant's Bank of Prince Edward Island, he foolishly imagined that it would soon put up its shutters. As in many other ways, he was evidently badly out.

MR. LOWE VS. MR. FARQUHARSON.

Sir,—Do we understand that a Mr. Lowe entered into a bargain with the government to build an addition to the asylum according to plans furnished by the Government, that the plans were defective and he could not proceed, that any changes necessary should be agreed to by the Government, that Government refused to correct the error, and make the foundation right or pay Mr. Lowe to do it, that he put material on the ground worth \$8000 getting \$1500 from the government and borrowing \$3000 from Mr. Nicholson to pay for the material, that he consequently put \$3,500 besides these amounts in it, and that, owing to the delay, the material costing \$8000, was sold at sheriff's sale at \$4,800, leaving a loss of \$3,200 to be borne by Mr. Lowe,—that the contractor Mr. Lowe has been ruined by this action of the government? Are these the facts, Mr. Editor? If so, it is a serious state of affairs. I don't find much fault with the Government for refusing a costly lawsuit, but to refuse a fair arbitration is highway robbery. A few years ago, the community was almost in arms over the Duchemin-Alley case. But Duchemin had access to the courts. But in this case the community sees a private citizen ruined by the government, and having her hands tied. Britain, today, is losing her best blood to give equal rights to her people in South Africa, and we are witnessing a fellow citizen plundered in cold blood before our eyes. Let us have the facts, Mr. Editor. There is surely a sense of fairplay left. If not, it will be a reproach to have been born in Prince Edward Island.

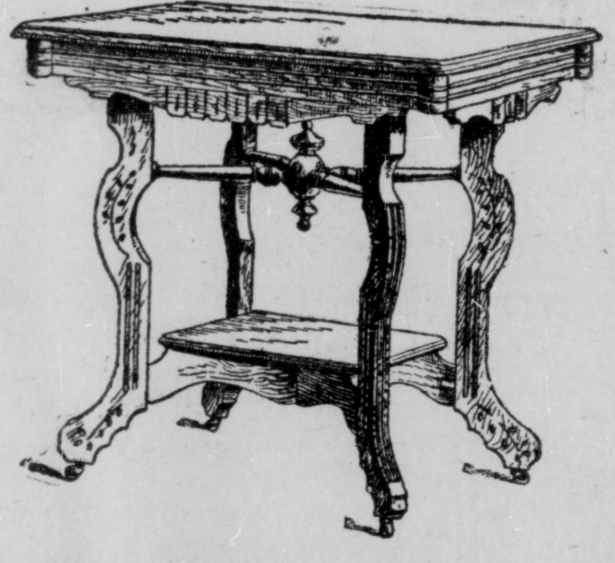
