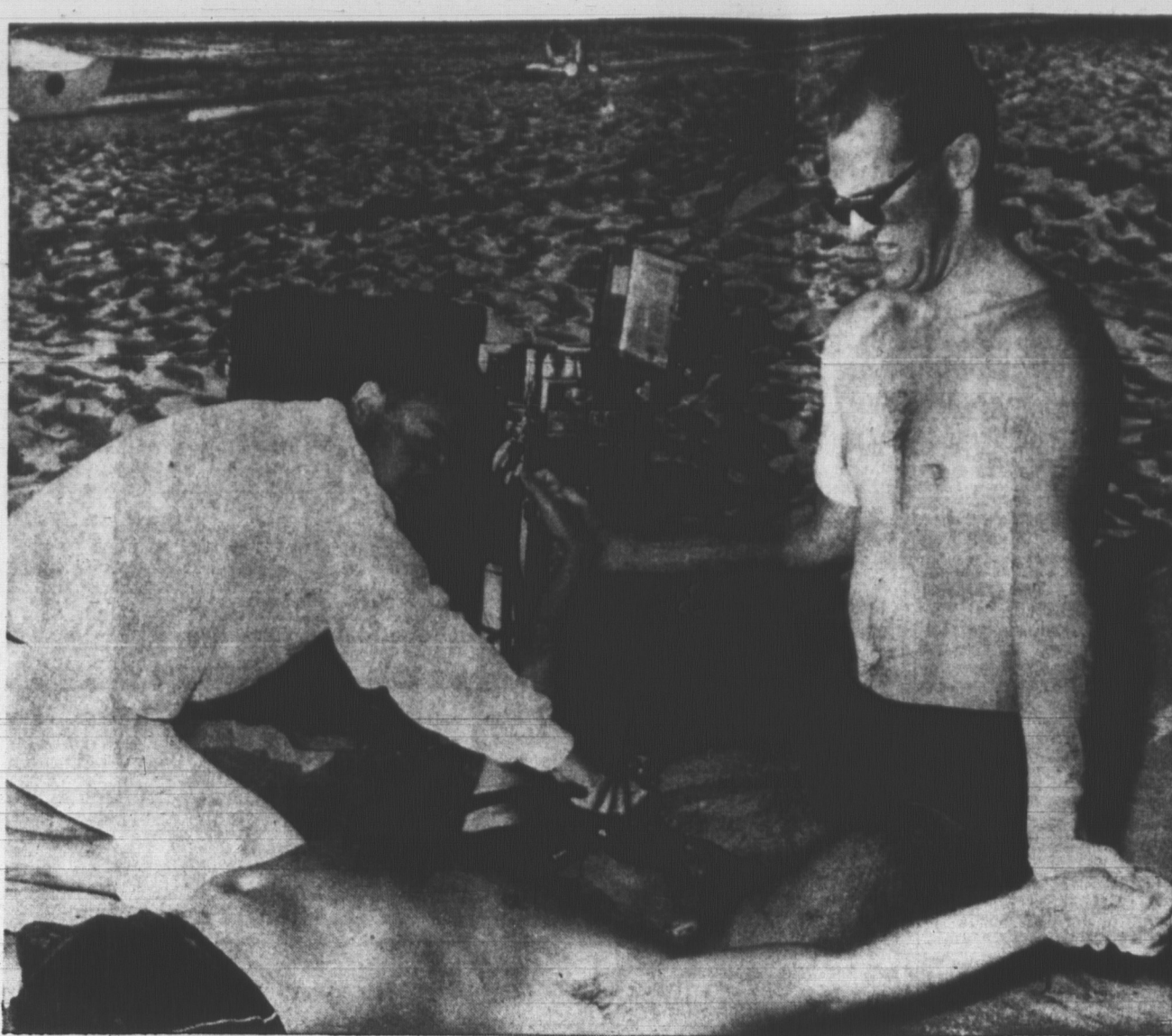


P.E.I. Lifeguards Give Big Show

The fifth annual National Parks Lifeguard Demonstration was presented to the general public last evening at Brackley and just in time for the large crowd present left doubting the capabilities of Canada's only group of Surf guards. The programme got underway with a demonstration of mouth to mouth resuscitation by six of the National park guards, Dave Large, Jim MacLean, Herb Murphy, Gerry Hopkin, Chuck Silliphant and Jimmy Webb took part in this demonstration and as they applied the technique, announcer Jim Benton commented on the significance of the various steps involved.

Following this exhibit spectators were shown the equipment which the guards have at their disposal and the part which each plays in the rescue of a drowning swimmer. Gerald Mitchell showed how a rescue would be accomplished using a paddle board, John Hughes the use of the boat and Jim Bruce the technique needed to accomplish a rescue with the torpedo buoy.

Next on the agenda was a demonstration of first aid, sponsored by the Red Cross. The audience was shown how to apply splints, control bleeding and

WINNIPEG (CP) — New Brunswick is to be short a good batter today when it meets Prince Edward Island in a consolation semi-final in the national junior baseball tournament.

Ken Scott, 19, of Marysville, N.B., nursed a sore leg in a hotel room here Sunday and said he "won't be playing."

He was at bat for the fourth time in Saturday's game with Quebec when he was hit above the knee on his left leg by a pitched ball.

He was carried from the field, had the leg wrapped and was kept off it Sunday.

Before he was hit, the young first baseman had hit three for three.

Quebec started its lead in the first inning with two runs, and piled them up steadily before exploding in the eighth inning for six and finishing ahead 16-5.

Winning pitcher was Gary Brown who struck out three, walked three and gave up 13 hits. Keith MacDonald took the loss after giving up four runs, including a 350-foot homer by Robert Bastien.

MacDonald was relieved after 4 1/3 innings by Jack Dean who was pulled for Jim Shanks midway through the eighth.

N.B.-P.E.I. Ch'ship Won By Forbes

EDMUNDSTON, N.B. (CP) — Grant Forbes, an 18-year-old from Edmundston, upset co-favorites Doug MacAfee of Sussex and Pierre Rossignol of Bathurst to capture the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island junior golf championship Sunday.

The grade 12 student at Cormier High School put together rounds of 74-75-79—228 for a five-stroke victory over MacAfee, the defending champion. MacAfee, a member of the N.B.-P.E.I. Willingdon cup team, had rounds of 78-79-76 over the tough Edmundston layout.

Rossignol, 18, finished in fourth place behind Jean Boudreau of Edmundston who carded scores of 78-78-79—235. Rossignol is also a member of the N.B.-P.E.I. Willingdon cup team. Rossignol turned in cards of 80-81-76 over the 54-hole course.

Forbes also won a berth on the N.B.-P.E.I. inter-provincial junior team. He had a 227 in the opening 54-holes of the 108-hole test. His aggregate, including the 54 holes over the weekend, was 455, four strokes behind MacAfee. The Sussex golfer had a 218 at Fredericton in the opening 54 and closed out with a 457.

Rossignol was one stroke behind Forbes in the team competitions. The fourth member of the team is Bob MacFarlane of Edmundston, who captured the N.B.-P.E.I. lefthander's championships in the amateur at Fredericton. MacFarlane's aggregate was 472. The team alternate is Kees Hulbers of Campbellton who had 474. Hulbers was a member of the team last year.

To be eligible for a berth on the squad, the juniors had to play in 108 holes. There were 24 eligibles with handicaps of eight or less.

Maurice Plourde of Edmundston captured the juvenile championship in a breeze. He had identical rounds of 84 and finished seven strokes ahead of Mike Whitty of Miramichi.

Dwight Lewis of Moncton captured the midget title with rounds of 88-80, three strokes ahead of Carl Shaw of Aroostook Valley.

Eighty-seven golfers took part in the two-day tournament.
