—**NEW INDUSTRY**  
Established In Summerside  
A new industry has been started in Summerside, in which an outlet has been provided for Prince County poultry at average market prices. Live chickens are bought, killed, plucked and dressed and shipped to the various markets. The factory is in the old station building, owned by Mr. Winsloe J. Lidstone and has been fixed up and put into first class shape for the new industry. As it is adjacent to the railway depot shipments are easily handled for export.  
—Mr. F. A. Hewitt of Montague, well known as a lobster packer and canner of chicken, has opened the new plant and his two sons, Messrs. B. L. and E. D. Hewitt are in charge. Several hundred live fowl are handled and one week nearly a thousand were prepared for market. Preparations are also underway for the canning of chickens in the fall. Cement floors are being laid down and rooms fitted up for this work. Mr. Hewitt has had a large experience in this work and has operated factories in Borden, Cardigan, Montague and Amherst, N.S.
