Power Break At Crossroads Thrusts Area Into Darkness

A break of unknown origin in the main high tension transmission line in the Crossroads area set off a chain reaction which plunged the entire area of Prince Edward Island into blacked-out last night. The cause of the power outage was a power break at the main plant of Maritime Electric Co. in Charlottetown.

At 8:25 last night, the main eastern line broke and left the lower voltage lines below causing a short. When the fault hit the circuit breaker at the main plant it caused it to trip inside and broke the lines to the water pumps for cooling. The fault that the plant may shut down.

At approximately 11 p.m. the main line was fixed and crews turned to repairing the masses of the circuit breaker switch.

The setting end of the province just the break at Crossroads was in darkness at press 11:30 last night while crews continued the long intricate job of completing the circuit at the plant. The broken line to the pumping station was repaired.

All available personnel of the company were immediately called to duty as they worked to repair the damage.

Boys Killed By Lightning Under Tree

ROSENDALE, N.Y. (AP)—A group of 11 boys bathing off a swimming party and took shelter under a tree when a sudden thunderstorm. Moments later a bolt of lightning killed two of them.
