## ACWW Delegate Reports On Conference In Edinburgh

Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie, Alberton, past president of the P.E.I. Women's Institutes and delegate to the Associated Country Women of the World conference held in Edinburgh, Scotland, in August presented her official report of the conference to an interested audience at Prince of Wales College last night.

Mrs. Wilkie stated that representatives from 31 countries attended the conference and each country sent greetings through its delegates. The main topic of the conference was "Peace through Understanding" and instances were given of how this may be accomplished through time.

At the conclusion of her account Mrs. Wilkie showed colored slides of many of the interesting and historical places she had visited and gave a brief commentary on each.
