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Anniversary Services At Alberton Church

Anniversary service in Alberton United Church yesterday opened with the singing of that well loved psalm, "The Lord's My Shepherd," the strains of which have risen within its walls for more than a century. The founding of the congregation dates back to the year 1831 and the present church edifice was built in 1856. The interior of the church was redecorated during the past summer and on Sunday beautiful autumn flowers and potted plants added to its beauty. Morning, afternoon and evening services were conducted by the minister, Rev. R. Wallis, and the guest preacher was Rev. A. S. Weir, president of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada, and a former well loved pastor of the Alberton charge which includes Casumpec and Tignish.

A feature of the morning service was the reading by the minister of a brief historical sketch which not only recalled the glorious past but also held a challenge for the present and the future in the life of the congregation. In the morning Mr. Weir's text was, "Man shall not live by bread alone but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." (Matthew 4:4). Man needs more than the ordinary requirements of physical life; other things are needful for his soul. Some of these needs are for beauty which ought to direct his eyes to the heavens, for truth to be found particularly in the Bible, and for good laws and justice. Man also needs the great institutions of home and church to spread abroad in the world the spirit of love.

The evening sermon was based on 2 Kings 6:17, and was a message of reassurance that as God helped His people in olden days so will He help and strengthen His people today, surrounding them with great invisible powers. In the afternoon there was a congregational fellowship service based on the theme, "The comprehensiveness of the Church." A very fine message on the theme was given by the minister, Rev. A. S. Weir, who described the church as God's instrument to do His will and extend His kingdom, to redeem the souls and restore the lives of men and to promote peace, goodwill and redemption. The membership must joyfully consecrate life and time and powers, through the church, to God and Jesus Christ, our Lord and Redeemer. At this service messages were received from former pastors and

statements of the aims and activities of the various organizations within the congregation were given. Mr. G. R. Leard of Casumpec, president of the Maritime Conference, Special music added to the beauty and inspiration of all services. The choir was under the direction of Mr. Cyril Leard, with Miss Annie Leard as organist. Anthems rendered were, "Onward Christian Soldiers" and "Again The Evening Shadows Fall."

A mixed male quartet comprised of Messrs. Percy Hardy, Roy Leard, Gordon Coffin and Cyril Leard rendered a "A Little Talk With Jesus" and in the evening they sang "Let The Lower Lights Be Burning."
