Lenten Meditation

COMMUNION OF SAINTS.

"The communion of saints" was
one of the last phrases to be in-
serted in the Apostles' creed, its
origin, and indeed its original
meaning, are hidden in obscurity,
but it has come to express one of
the most precious of Christian be-
liefs.

In the New Testament the word
saint is not used of any special
group of Christians within the
Church, but of all members as be-
longing to that community which
had been set apart, sanctified, by
the redemption that Christ had
brought. As the centuries went by
it came to be used more precisely
for those who, by martyrdom or by
evident holiness of life, showed in
a special way the sanctifying grace
of God.

Some ambiguity, therefore, still
attaches to the observance of the
festival of All Saints. Some confine
its meaning to the thankful com-
memoration of those whom the
Church has come to call saints in
the special sense—for example,
the Apostles; some feel entitled to
associate with the festival obscure
Christian folk, especially their own
departed friends and loved ones,
if they have belonged in any way
to the Christian fellowship. All
Saints' Day, which came to follow
All Souls' Day, which came to fol-
low All Saints' Day, when all the
Christian departed could be spec-
ially remembered, has tended to

re-establish itself in Anglican use
in recent years.
Both of these special days em-
phasize one truth—the continuing
fellowship between those who serve
Christ on earth and those who
serve him beyond the veil of death.
This truth needs constant reasser-
tion. It is the only adequate solace
in bereavement, and the only
adequate safeguard against allur-
ing, but often illusory, substitutes
for the communion of saints.

Although emphasis on this doc-
trine has often been a feature of
the "catholic" side of Christian
history, the doctrine itself has
never been better expressed than
in the poem of Richard Baxter,
the great seventeenth-century
puritan—"He wants not friends
that hath thy love," printed in
many modern hymn books. In
this doctrine he found solace in
adversity, finding that in the
communion of saints was "wisdom,
safety and delight."

These are the essential notes of
the communion of saints—joint
sharing in the life of Christ, which
works alike in those who belong to
the Church triumphant; and
joint sharing in that godward life
of worship and prayer which is
the supreme blessing of "the dead
which die in the Lord," and the
clearest anticipation of final bless-
edness open to those still on pil-
grimage.

proximate. There is often the "one
fact more." This one fact might
turn the scale the other way.
Once a poor widow, with her
children tugging at her skirts,
went into the temple of the High-
est, holding in her work-worn
hand two mites—all she had of
the world, and she shyly deposited
it where the rich were making
their gifts. It looked so trifling
beside theirs, but it has been made
romantic and has given an impetus
to the stream of charity for
nineteen centuries. After all, who
knows what is really "great" or
"small"?

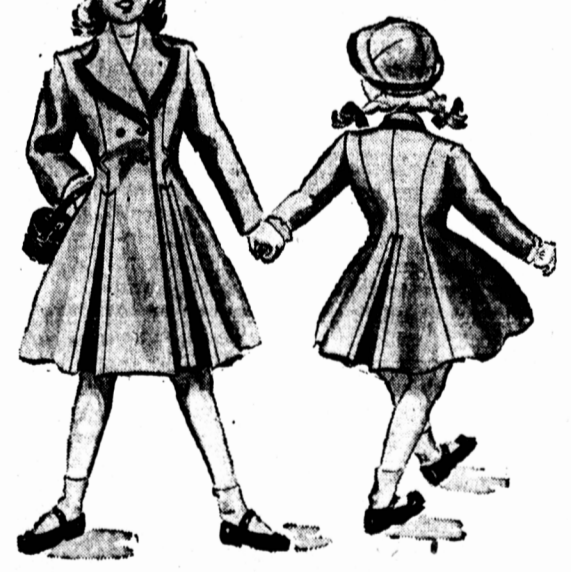
