

Boston Ties Maple Leafs; Chicago Defeats Rangers

BOSTON (CP)—Leon Labine's goalmouth rebound shot on one goal to pull Boston into a 3-3 National Hockey League tie with Toronto Maple Leafs Sunday night. It was the second dramatic finish for the Bruins in two days.

The Bruins just had time to save the game and Labine turned the trick when a Larry Regan shot bounded off Maple Leaf goalie Ed Chadwick onto Leo's stick. The right-winger fired it into the nets and the 13,695 garden fans went wild.

Boston scored three goals in the last three minutes and 18 seconds Saturday to defeat Detroit 5-3 here in a nationally televised thriller.

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St. Dunstons University Wins First League Game

St. Dunstan's University hoopers, flashing brilliant form in almost every department, streaked to a 65-49 victory over Mount Allison University Hawks in the opening game of the N.B.-P.E.I. Intercollegiate Basketball League played at the S.D.U. gym Saturday night.

The determined Saints, led by the fancy sharpshooting of captain Lorne McGuigan, who swished through 22 points, never looked back as they built up an early first period lead, held a ten point edge at the halfway mark, and finished the contest with 16 points to spare.

Backing up McGuigan's high scoring efforts was guard Pete McGonnell's deadly overhead set shooting that netted him 12 points. Chick Morrison's amazing all-over-the-court play as he broke up plays and snatched rebounds in a will-o'-the-wisp display that drew the plaudits of the fans, and center Gerry Tingley's back board play and hook shooting that keynoted his 12 point effort.

Using only seven men in the thrilling, rugged encounter, Father Walter McGuigan's Red and White shirted squad forced the Garnet and Gold to change their style on three occasions. At the outset of the game the Hawks used a full court press to work

a baffling weave that threw the Saints off balance momentarily. Fine defensive play by McGuigan, Morrison, Tingley, Fearon and McGonnell, slowed the Mountie attack and eventually forced them into a three-two offense.

All through the contest the Mounties had trouble with the effective man-to-man defense tossed at them by the Saints with the result that no Mountie A player scored more than three field goals. Left wing Hoisak was the big Mountie offensively with 15 points, nine of them on free tosses. Penner had nine for the losers, while Black and Essing shipped in seven each.

Fouls were a dime a dozen in the rugged encounter as referees Don Hepburn and Harold Hovatt dished out 46 personal and three technicals. Mount A. picked up 25 of the infractions and had three men banished: St. Dunstan's were caught 24 times and lost two men before the end of the game.

In the free throw department, which was slightly less than sensational, the Hawks edged the Saints as they dunked 19 out of 35 attempts, while the local collegians could do no better than connect on 17 out of 33.

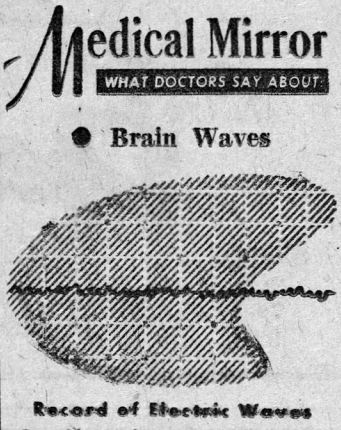
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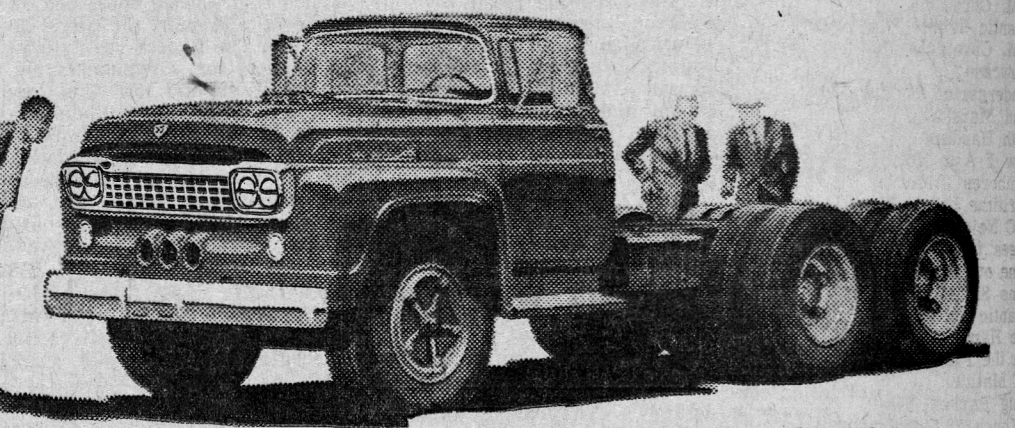
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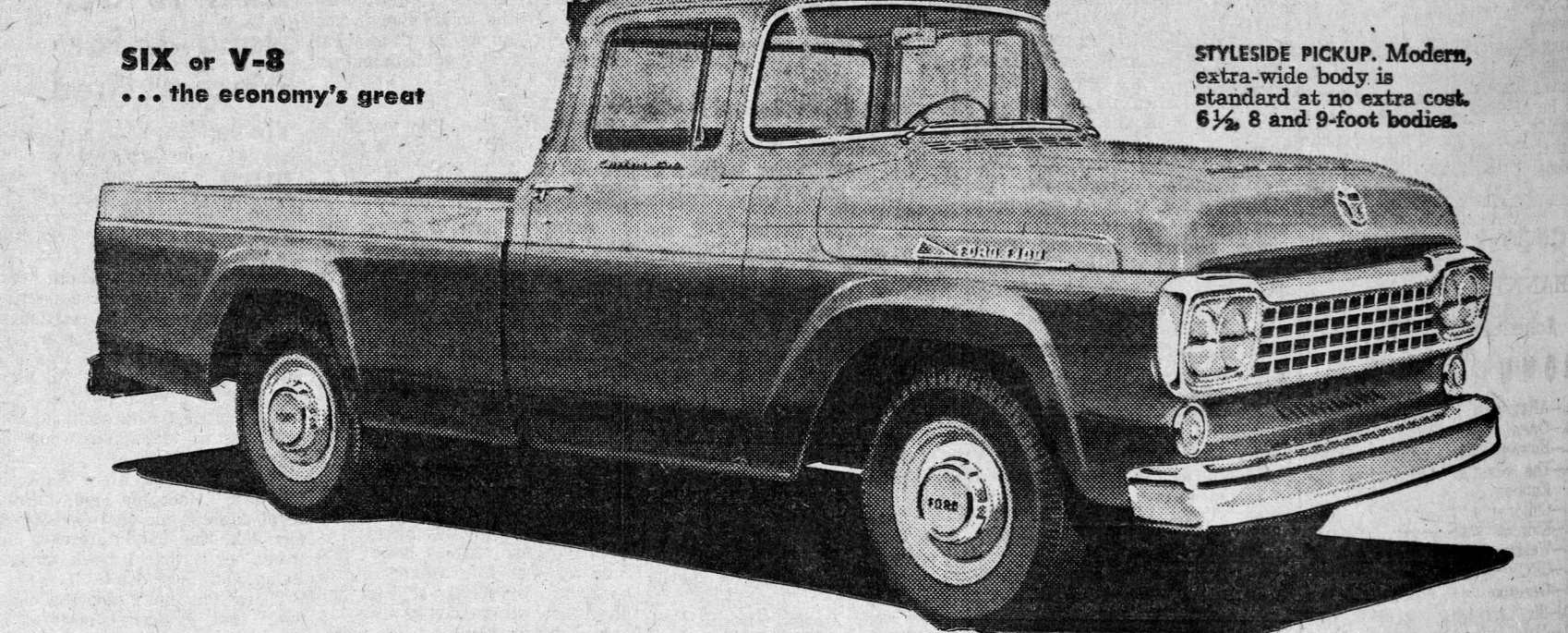
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
