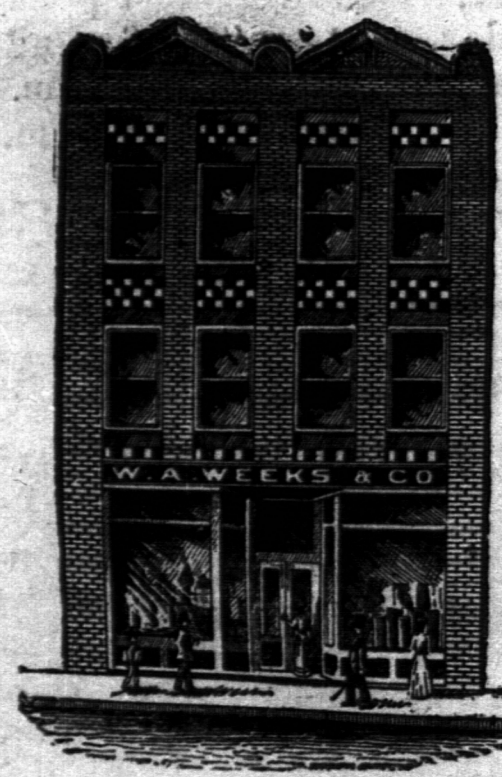

This potato bug is proving so destructive to the potato fields around Cape Breton and Tryon that several farmers have ploughed up their fields and sown buckwheat and other late grains. Paris green is coming into general use and it is to be hoped may prove successful on the Island as it has in the Upper Provinces and United States in scouring the plants from from Ingersoll, Ont., in conversation with a GUARDIAN reporter recently, stated that they had contended for the last twelve years with the potato bug and had not lost a crop. The farmers watch closely for the first appearance of the pest, and as soon as the first eggs are laid go over the tops of the plants with an application of ground lead plaster and paris green. A tin dish with a perforated cover is used, and the mixture generally applied to the plant when the dew is falling in the evening, so as to cause it to stick. If the Paris green is good a few applications will prove effectual. Where lead plaster cannot be obtained flour shorts is used with good effect.

Summerside Schools.

Sir, - As it had been my custom for a number of years to attend the annual school concert, I went there this year as usual, but found a small gathering as compared with former years; upon making inquiry as to the cause, I was told that it was owing to the fact that the Eastern District pupils were not taking any part in it. I noticed that nearly all the pupils who took part were girls, most of them young ladies, and I must say they were very nice looking and acted their part well. I was unable to ascertain why the boys of the higher grades took no part. The only address of the evening was from Chairman Strong. He spoke in the highest terms of the proficiency of the work done by the teachers in all respects, also of the superior judgment of the trustees in securing such a staff of teachers. Now I would like right here to ask the question, why were three of those efficient teachers removed from the list by those trustees of such superior judgment? Why did he suppress the fact of their removal from the staff? Again, let me ask why were they removed when the parents, trustees and the superintendent all agree that the work done by them was highly satisfactory in all respects. The writer once heard Mr. Strong compare the female teachers of this town to angels; evidently does not like angels that have done good work in all respects and so has cast his ballot against them. Granted that the Summerside schools have done good work in the past year, yet in looking back for a number of years, notwithstanding boasted "attainments" of the higher grades, I don't find that they have turned out more than their share of successful scholars compared with other schools in different parts of the Island. All will admit that the higher departments of the Summerside schools have many advantages over the country schools. This year we only find one who has passed through the P. W. College and with only a second class license. All do not agree with Mr. Strong's remarks. One parent, who had a son attending the Summerside high school for years and who had passed through the Eighth room and was counted with others as being fit for McGill when he left school, was very much provoked on receiving a letter from him to see among other mistakes a part of his clothing spelled "pance." Some might say that it would be more in keeping with the times had his father suppressed the letter.
