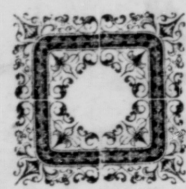

THE GIANTS OF JUPITER

It Would Be Just as Well to Leave That Planet Alone.

A great deal has been said and much speculation has been indulged in with reference to the question whether the celestial worlds are inhabited by intelligent beings similar to the earth-inhabiting man. It scarcely admits of a doubt that this interesting question will ever remain a mere matter of speculation, but let us suppose that beings resembling in stature were dwelling on those glorious orbs we see in the vast vault of the heavens, and let us investigate what proportions they would bear to us to provide the length of their bodies were in the same ratio to the diameter of their respective globe as ours to the diameter of the earth.

The average inhabitant of the planet Jupiter would stand about 60 feet in height.

Were such a Jovian to visit our earth he would be able to walk on the summit of the highest mountain, or to dislocate his neck to look into the topmost stories of our metropolitan buildings.

A Jovian infant's arms would be supported by us as a very comfortable bed to rest in.

The huge soldiers of Arioivians, whose mere sight struck terror into Caesar's legions, would be compared with the Jovian soldier, say, the latter would coolly pierce King Arioivius himself, with three or four of his body guards, and put them into his knapsack to keep them as anti-gated toys to play with during the hours of rest.

Nature's Care of Seed.

In some parts of the world, notably in the Malay Archipelago, vast quantities of vegetable matter are always floating about on the sea, says the Washington Star.

On the Moluccas Islands the trees seem to dip with the waves of the ocean. For the possession of sea shells, not only are their roots and stems exposed to the waves of the sea, but their branches are inclined in the same direction and are battered by the tides.

The numerous currents of the Moluccas Sea are charged with seaweed, intermingled with flowers, fruits, coconuts, nuts or other palms and even whole trees.

The amount of driftwood thrown upon all shores is enormous. Eskimo along the Arctic coast of Alaska depend upon it wholly for wood supply.

Native of the central Islands of the Pacific get all their tools from the roots of drifted trees, in which the stones were found imbedded.

The curious fact of most interesting nature is that of distributing plants through the world.

Darwin, who devoted much attention to investigating the matter, proved that many kinds of seeds will bear immersion in water for 100 days, or even months, and will retain their vitality, so that when thrown ashore they are ready to sprout.

Not a few species, which will sink when green, float if they have been left to dry before falling into the stream which carries them to the ocean.

For the very purpose of accomplishing this distribution by water, the husks of the seeds are provided with seeds practically waterproof.

Among the familiar objects picked up on the ocean beach are the so-called sea beans. It is popularly supposed that the plants which bear these beans grow in the water.

The beans are found in enormous quantities on the Florida shores, and in diminishing numbers northward along the Atlantic coast.

They are the seeds of pod bearing vines—climbing plants plentiful along the shores of the Caribbean sea.

Each pod, resembling an exaggerated pea pod, contains a number of seeds. The latter, falling when ripe into the water, are carried by the cold stream around the south end of Florida and up the Atlantic coast.

There are three important varieties, one round and flat, another round and round and gray, and the third much bigger and of a mahogany color.

Hog Experiments.

Two important experiments with feeding hogs have been made. One was at our experiment farm at Ottawa, and the other was considered well worth a warm or cold feed is the best.

Results of the experiment seemed to show that cooking the food for the hogs was not profitable. In the experiments small and small grain were fed raw and cold, and also the same amount warmed by steam.

In Bulletin 22 of the Minnesota station the question of wet or dry feed for hogs has been considered. Hogs are not greedy creatures that they are inclined to swallow their food so rapidly that it is not digested properly with the saliva.

In the case of dry feed this is impossible, but a great deal of their wet feed is thus taken into the stomach.

The wet feed, however, is so much more attractive to the hogs that they will eat a great deal more than of dry feed, and as they are considered well worth a warm or cold feed is the best.

Where hog feed is cheap it pays the farmer to give them wet feed in abundance rather than dry. But if feed is expensive, and every pound is a loss unless great gain is obtained, a less liberal feeding on partly dry feed would result more profitably.

Baby the Animals.

A Kansas farmer heard him complain that they did not do well for him, and he gave as his reason that B had babbled them. And he is the man that would succeed with cows.

Why could not a baby them, too? A "told on himself" when he made that remark.

We doubt not that our friend John could babble his cows. Terry labors his potatoes; Greiner makes his garden his pet. That is the way to succeed.

But we had rather buy cows from a farm where they had not been taken care of quite so well as we propose to do it, rather than from one where they have been better cared for than we care for them.

Cows take kindly to any advance in treatment, but not to poorer treatment than they have been used to.

This is why some make a failure of buying fine blooded stock. The cattle are not as well cared for as they have been used to, and they cannot stand neglect or ordinary treatment so well as animals that have never known any other.

But babbled stock if you are really to baby them a little more yet, and you will be all right.

The Imperial Flower of Japan.

In Japan the chrysanthemum is the national flower—the imperial emblem. For centuries it has been embroidered on the robes of the emperors.

Once a year, when the chrysanthemum is in full flower, royal gifts are made in honor. Invitations are only extended to those of high rank. Upon these festive days the gardens are thrown open, and the chrysanthemum is queen of the hour.—Ladies' Home Journal.

PERPETUAL MOTION OF ATOMS AND MOLECULES.

Every body is composed of a multitude of extremely, but not infinitely, small molecules, and it might be thought, says Mr. B. Ball (according to a contributor in the New York, England, Chronicle), that in the solid, at all events, the little particles must be clustered together in a compact mass.

But the truth is far more wonderful. Were the sensibility of our eyes increased so as to make them of a million times more powerful, it would be seen that the diamond atoms, which form a perfect gem when aggregated in sufficient myriads, are each in a condition of rapid movement of the most complex description.

Each molecule would be seen swinging to and fro with the utmost violence among the neighboring molecules and quivering about its position as if it were a ball in contact with the most elastic of springs.

Such encounters with other molecules, which occur millions of times in each second. The hardness and impenetrability so characteristic would at first sight seem to be due to the repulsion that it is more than a cluster of rapidly moving particles; but the well known penetrability of the gem arises from the fact that, when attempt is made to press a steel wire against the stone, it falls between the rapidly moving molecules, and the stone rather the metal with such extraordinary violence that it is rare to allow it to penetrate or even to make the crystallized surface. When glass is cut with a diamond, the edge which is cut is really composed of rapidly moving atoms. The glass which is cut is also merely a mass of moving molecules, and what seems to happen is that as the diamond is pressed forward, its several particles, by their superior vigor, drive the little particles of glass out of the way.

BLOOD IN THE ROPE WALKER

M. Blondin, now in his 71st year, is giving marvelous performances upon the high rope at the Crystal Palace, London.

In 1859 he walked across the Niagara Falls on a rope 1,100 feet long, stretched at a height of 160 feet above the torrent.

At the Crystal Palace his performance is upon a rope stretched across the centre transept at a height of 60 feet above the ground. The rope, which is an inch and three-quarters in diameter, is made of steel wire, covered with strands of manilla, and from anchor to anchor it is 400 feet long.

Blondin walks the rope blindfolded, stands on his head, carries a man on his back, and performs other feats, all of which are accomplished with the old grace and daring.
