COMPOSER URGES SCHOLARSHIP FOR ISLAND SINGING STUDENT

Quick to spot talent, John Gardner, one of England's leading composers and past musical director of the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden, has chosen a young island singing student of the Guildhall School of Music, as a "vote" to keep an ear to Miss Gaelyne Craig scholarship winner in both P.E.I. and Nova Scotia's Musical Festivals, the plucky young Canadian; as she is known to fellow students at Guildhall, has been lucky to win his praise. The London musician, impressed by her musical ability and admiring her courage, has urged that Charlottetown help her studies along with a scholarship.

"Miss Craig has a voice of great beauty," he will tell any interested Charlottetownian. And if it is allowed to develop, it will one day make her into one of Charlottetown's most notable citizens. Someone of whom you will be especially proud, all of you!" Gaelyne, whose blond curly hair and lyric soprano voice are even now, becoming familiar to audiences of student productions, is well deserving of the nickname "plucky." Part-time work and baby-sitting to help pay for music tuition and board began in Prince of Wales College days. She's still at it. "It's a good thing I like children," she says, "I've been able to pay for a lot of lessons by looking after them." While working as a draftsman at the Naval Dockyard in Halifax she baby-sat to help pay for lessons with Audrey Farnell.

Her voice was pleasant and she began to win firsts in Nova Scotia's Musical Festivals. No one, certainly not Gaelyne, dreamed that adjectives like "gifted," "talented," "charming," would come her way. They did. During the 1952 Festival held in Halifax an English adjudicator urged her to study in his native London.

Armed with her winnings from the Nova Scotia Festival, gifts from Charlottetown friends and several clubs and with the good wishes her first music teacher, Miss Lillian McKenzie she bought a one-way ticket to England. With determination she began the rounds of London's employment agencies. Following a series of ups and downs she managed to pay her board and tuition. But a full-time job cut her practice hours and limited her classes at the Guildhall School.

Within several terms she had attracted the attention of her instructors, the staff of the youth hostel where she boarded, and the Victoria League, an association interested in assisting and promoting Commonwealth students. Suddenly Gaelyne found herself with a sponsor, Miss McSwiney, whose hobby is helping young musicians. She received a scholarship from the Englishwoman, payment of tuition fees.

Earning her living, doing solo work with a choir, and filling singing engagements takes precious time from a serious music student. "It will be the greatest tragedy," the former musical director of England's famous Covent Garden has written Charlottetown friends of Gaelyne, "if Miss Craig does not make the world grade for which she is obviously cut out just because she can't find time, (through having at this juncture to earn her living) to do those six hours of concentrated technical practise each day."

Echoing John Gardner is her instructor at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, Ellis Keeler.

Gideons Reach New Milestone In Canada

TORONTO, Ont., The month of November saw the placing of the one-and-one half millionth copy of the Scriptures in Canada by The Gideons. This was the cumulative effort of the past 43 years, the period in which The Gideons have been organized in Canada, and carrying on this Bible-placing ministry as an association of Christian commercial and business men. The one-millionth copy of the Scriptures was placed in January

1952, in Victoria Hospital, in London, Ontario, since which time a period of a little over two-and-a-half years, one-half a million books have been sent out. Of this impressive total, complete Bibles numbered one-half a million, familiar sights in hotels, motels, hospitals, schools and prisons. New Testaments made up the balance and were presented to nurses in training, service personnel and to school children. Apart from these Canadian placements, many thousands of copies of the Scriptures have been sent overseas to England and to Japan. The current foreign enterprise of The

Gideons International in Canada by the supplying of upwards of 25,000 copies of a bi-lingual Spanish-English New Testament for distribution in hotel guest rooms in Mexico. A work now well underway.
