## POULTRY

The poultry entry was down somewhat from last year but the quality of birds shown was on a par with last year. Judging was by Mr. Charles Scranton, poultry production services, assisted by Lorne Ramsay, head poultryman at the Experimental Farm, and Merlin MacDonald, poultryman, Provincial Department of Agriculture.

Alvin MacDonald of Covehead dominated the Bantam, Rock and New Hampshire classes as well as the cross breeds. Raynor's Poultry Farm, from Mount Herbert, was outstanding in the Leghorn and Black Minorca class. There was an excellent showing of Toulouse geese by Mr. Almon Boswell, Marshfield.

Egg classes were well filled with close competition. Raynor's Poultry Farm took top honors in this class.

Horse judging under the watchful eye of J. M. MacCallum of Ottawa was carried out in the morning and Judge MacCallum was called upon to make close decisions in many of the classes.

Miss Laura Watts of Pleasant Grove won first in both the two year old and three year old Standard Bred Class. She was also winner of the male championship and female championship going to Commander G. H. Buxton of Charlottetown. Earl Semple of Ottawa won the two year old female class and Fulton Willis of Milton came first in the three year old female class.

## KEEN COMPETITION ANTICIPATED FOR TOP HONORS IN GUERNSEYS

Some of the top breeders in Eastern Canada will be competing for honors in the Guernsey ring at the Provincial Exhibition here today. Records speak for themselves and they speak in pleasing terms of such men as Guy Rodd of Brackley and Eric Hurry of Winoak. More recent additions to Guernsey top honors are such men as Ernest F. Coles and Son of Milton and Harold Palmer of Kensington. Both men have in their stables animals that drew honorable mention in All Canadian awards. Another breeder, Daniel MacLean of Milton, has a most unusual claim to fame in production circles. All of these breeders are showing here today.

MacLean had just about called it quits on Sunday. A painful accident suffered during having made it difficult to get his cattle in to the show. But Monday morning the MacLean cattle were trucked to the grounds. Today they were ready to show with the others.

Guy Rodd had a dispersal sale a little more than a year ago. But he kept four of the top females in his herd. Among them is Brackley Langwater Melba, the dam of two heifers that have figured largely in All Canadian awards. Brackley Belinda was junior All Canadian a couple of years ago. Her full sister, Brackley Nancy 2nd, was reserve Junior for all Canadian last year. In this year's reserve senior, all Canadian is a two-year-old. In addition she ranked either sixth or seventh in the Honor Roll as a two-year-old in the 305-day division.

**Present Sire**  
Mr. Rodd's present sire is Brooklin Anchor's Patrician. His dam was All Canadian senior in 1933 and prize winner at the Royal Winter Fair. She was classified as excellent, so did the four nearest dams of this bull.

Last year's calf from the dam of the heifers was sold to Frank Saunders of Aylesford, the current president of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders Association. A full brother lying by his dam's side in the stable on the grounds all he was calving only five days ago. In addition Mr. Rodd has bred two other animals that received honorable mention in All Canadian awards. That makes seven animals bred or owned by Mr. Rodd.

A. B. Cutcliffe won the reserve grand championship for females. In the Roadsters, Herbert Buchanan, Fredericton; H. Lloyd Palmer, Charlottetown; William Munroe, Charlottetown; and Randall MacDonald of Peters Road were the winners. The last mentioned took the mare or gelding class in harness before 1951, and the mare with foal at foot class.

Horse judging will continue this morning at 9 o'clock. Cattle breeds taking the ring will be the Guernseys, Holsteins and Shorthorns. The results of the sheep exhibit will also be known by tomorrow.

**Rule Train Crash Deaths Accidental**  
QUEBEC (CP) — A coroner's jury has ruled that four persons died accidentally in the crash of a Canadian National Railway train at Montmagny, Que., April 7, it was learned here Tuesday.

The jury, sitting at Montmagny July 30, recommended that provincial police continue their investigation of the accident involving a passenger train enroute to Montreal from Halifax.

Killed in the wreck were three train crew members: J. D. Levesque of Riviere du Loup, Que., engineer; Gaudiose Thibault, also of Riviere du Loup, fireman; and G. E. Belanger of St. Vallier, Que., brakeman. The body of John Price of Campbellton, N. B., was found near the wreck scene. His death also was described as accidental. Only one passenger was injured.

The accident occurred when the express swerved onto a siding near Montmagny, 30 miles east of here, and crashed into a freight shed.

Outstanding animal in the Jersey herd of Edison B. Mutch was his senior sire, Edgelea Beacon Jesters Standard, that won the grand championship ribbon for him at the Royal Winter Fair in 1933. Mr. Mutch had quite a day for himself in the ring here yesterday with a total of twelve reserve ribbons. He had two seconds, five thirds and a number of other good placings.

He took the senior and grand female championship ribbons with Rivernorth Jester's Nicky, junior female championship with Rivernorth Oscar's Star and the reserve junior male with Rivernorth Bonny's Beacon. Thus he got three of the championships and one reserve.

The runners-up were Clark Brothers of North Wiltshire with six first place ribbons, five seconds and four thirds. The Clark herd walked off with the Junior male championship with Hedgelea Jester George.

Jim Vickerson of North River was a strong third. He also appeared to be a very popular showman and popular winner. When he took his first red ribbon with Warren Grove Fanny's Beacon there was a round of applause. All together he took four first placings and wound up with a reserve senior and a reserve grand female championship. That came to him on Rivernorth Oscar's Star, a four year old, dry cow.

He also had two seconds, four thirds and three fourths.

## OFFICE SECRETARY'S JOB NO EASY ONE AT THE EXHIBITION

From a small office underneath the main grandstand at the Charlottetown Exhibition, supervision is exercised over the many activities which go to make up the annual Fair now in progress. This control centre is in charge of Miss Bertie Stewart, who is the year-around office secretary of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Exhibition Association.

This of course is Miss Stewart's busiest week of the year and during this rush period she has four assistants. Her office these days is a beehive of activity from early morn until midnight, and Miss Stewart handles hundreds of problems daily. Horsemen, livestock exhibitors, tourists, judges of livestock, and various and assorted persons, flock to this information centre throughout every day of the show.

Bees being the hub of the show generally, it is the place people go to locate lost articles—gloves, hats, coats, money, and even lost children.

With years of experience as a background, Miss Stewart handles the many details of a heavy job expertly and efficiently. Leading up to the show she carries on correspondence with the hundreds of people who in some way will participate in the Exhibition.

**A Multiple Job**  
Mr. H. J. Kennedy, manager of the show, refers to Miss Stewart as his right hand man. "Miss Stewart," says Mr. Kennedy, "knows all about this business, and has everything at her finger tips." In any case as office secretary, Miss Stewart has little time for leisure.

Prior to the Show this year, she had to deal with 1500 livestock entries, all of which had to be catalogued, and a judge list prepared for each exhibit. This in itself is a sizeable job, but this

is only one task of the many making up her heavy routine of work. She handles the correspondence for instance, about the engagement of the vaudeville troupes. She does the stenographic work in the inter-change of letters which develops between her office and scores of horsemen. It is she who maintains the payroll when extra men are engaged for repairs to buildings, and for the erection of new barns and stables. She is paymaster also for the part-time staff, and calls the roll each evening to see that all are present.

She is too who hands out the pay envelopes, to ticket sellers, guards and traffic control men.

**Many Inquiries**  
She carries in her head a thousand details about the doings on the grounds and answers a steady stream of questions directed to her by callers, throughout the day. Somebody wishes to get in touch with the livestock judges; a visitor wishes to know how to reach the hand-craft exhibit; an exhibitor wants a sticker for his car or truck, so that he will be able to enter the grounds with the vehicle; a lady calls to say that she has lost her pocket book; Miss Stewart handles all these cases with despatch. Somewhere on the grounds a man or woman takes a weak with the judge's stand, from which a call goes over the loudspeaker system for a Doctor. Horsemen ask where they can get in touch with the race secretary, Mr. Acorn. In every instance Miss Stewart has the answer, or takes the necessary action. Between times she attends the constantly ringing telephone, and somebody or other carries on clerical work as well. The busy office secretary is the answer woman of the big Show.

## Maritime Board Urges Guarantee Of Uninterrupted Ferry Service

The effect of a possible railway strike action on the most vital link this Province has with the mainland via the presently operated C.N.R. ferry service at Borden has prompted the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade to again bring to the attention of authorities the necessity of maintaining the service under all circumstances.

A policy statement issued by the Board regarding the matter has been forwarded to the principal Federal officials, the presidents of both major railroads and the four premiers of the Atlantic Provinces. It maintains that in the past strike action on the part of the employees of the Canadian railways has jeopardized the economy of the Province; through curtailment of vital ferry services.

The Board has recommended that a guarantee be given the Atlantic Provinces by the Government of Canada that in event of future strikes ferry services operated by the railways will be maintained. To this end it suggests that the service be placed in the hands of the Department of Transport to ensure uninterrupted service. It is felt that no segment of the transportation field should be able to curtail operational activities of other modes of transportation.
