

**The Hunter Burglary.**

PRISONER REMANDED FOR TRIAL IN THE SUPREME COURT.

The prisoner Annie McInnis, charged with entering the house of Mr. E. G. Hunter on the night of the 5th of August and stealing therefrom \$200 worth of jewelry, was further examined before R. R. Fitzgerald, Esq., Stipendiary Magistrate, this (Monday) morning. Charles Palmer, Esq., appeared on behalf of the prosecutor, and Robert Shaw, Esq., on behalf the defendant.

Mrs. Hunter was examined. She gave details of the robbery, a description of the watch, chain, rings and brooch stolen, and said that after discovering the house had been robbed, she declared to Mrs. Stewart (who resides in the house next to Mr. Hunter's) that she would have all Charlottetown searched for the stolen goods. She at that time accused no particular person, nor did she suspect any one. On the morning following the robbery the prisoner went to her and said: "she heard that she (Mrs. Hunter) was going to have the house which she lived in searched." Tears were in her eyes at the time and she appeared distressed. She, later on, said she had been accused of the robbery, and asked Mrs. Hunter what she would do. Mrs. Hunter told her to prove her innocence, and have the parties who accused her punished for defamation of character. During several conversations Mrs. Hunter testified that the prisoner asked her "if she returned the property would that clear her. Mrs. Hunter said: "Certainly. If you return it I will not appear against you." Mrs. Hunter said that she did not understand from what the prisoner said about returning the jewelry that she had anything to do with stealing it.

Mrs. Stewart (who resides in the next house to Mr. Hunter's) testified that she had conversations with the prisoner similar to those which Mrs. Hunter had, and that she advised her "If she was unfortunate enough to have taken the things to give them up." Mrs. Stewart also said the prisoner told her that she spoke to her servant through the window on the night of the robbery, about 9 o'clock, and also that she was at a party that night, and came home between nine and ten o'clock for a lunch.

Mrs. Stewart's servant—Katie Walsh—testified that on the night of the robbery, after nine o'clock the prisoner passed up and down the street in company with two young men. The witness—when they passed—was looking out of the front window. Ten minutes elapsed between the time they passed up and the time they passed down.

The above is the evidence adduced for the prosecution. Mr. Shaw, counsel for the prisoner, produced three witnesses—Mrs. Andrew McDonald, Miss Kate Campbell and Vernon McNeill—all of whom swore positively that the prisoner was at a party at Mr. Andrew McDonald's, Spring Park, from between eight and nine o'clock on the night of the robbery until the following morning, and that it would be impossible for her to be away from the house long enough to commit the robbery without their knowledge.

The prisoner was remanded for trial in the Supreme Court. Howlett was held as witness.

**BITTEN BY A DOG.**—A Halifax exchange states that a Mr. Matheson—one of the elders of Chalmers' Church—while on his way home from a Sunday-school gathering, "feeling in love and charity with all creation," was severely bitten in the back of the leg, near the knee, by a large and vicious dog. It was with difficulty that Mr. Matheson was enabled to get to his home where, from the effects of the bite, he is confined to his bed. Action has been taken for damages in this case. Our civic authorities deserve the severest censure for their neglect to enforce their own by-law relating to dogs. Our streets and squares are frequently full of dogs, running at large, in open violation of all law. The by-law in question imposes a fine on the owners of dogs found on the streets without collars. Dogs are also to be registered in a book to be kept by the clerk of the City Court. Is this enforced? In fact, this by-law, like other enactments of our civic authorities, is a dead letter.

**A NEW WHARF AT CARDIGAN BRIDGE.**—Owen Connolly, Esq., of this city, has staked off a wharf in connection with his large establishment at Cardigan Brigs. This wharf will extend to the channel, a distance of about 450 feet, and will be over 100 feet wide. It is to be built principally of brush. Already this noble enterprise is affording employment to a large number of people. Brush hauling for the new wharf has commenced in good earnest, and hundreds of loads can be seen daily arriving from the adjoining woods. Mr. Connolly has now in King's County three large and prosperous mercantile establishments, namely: at Montague, Cardigan and Souris.

**WILE AT THE POOR HOUSE** a few days ago, the writer was shown an old woman, who had long feared the loss of her nose through cancer, and who has been completely cured by Dr. Creamer. LONDON, Jan. 10.

The Catholic Bishop of the Diocese of Achony, Ireland, in acknowledging the French subscription for the relief of Ireland, dwelt on the pitiful condition of his flock, and declares it is painful to have to stretch out the hand towards America and France, rather than to flourishing England, which yearly receives millions from Ireland in taxes.

ROME, Jan. 10.

The Court of Appeals has annulled the marriage of General Garibaldi with the Countess Raimondi.

Dr. Wm. Budd, an eminent physician, and author of many medical treatises is dead.

LONDON, Jan. 10.

The Lord Mayor has received a telegram from Brisbane, Queensland, stating that the Bank will pay £500 as the first contribution of that Colony to the Irish Relief Committee.

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.

The new regulations for the Weights and Measures Act are published. The contents are as already foreshadowed.

The revenue for the first six months of the fiscal year is one million dollars less than the expenditure. The revenue in December increased \$150,000, the expenditure increased \$1,500,000. The expenditure from July to December increased \$2,500,000 over the corresponding period in the fiscal year preceding. In the month of October alone, \$25,000 in duty were paid on breadstuffs and \$52,000 on coal.
