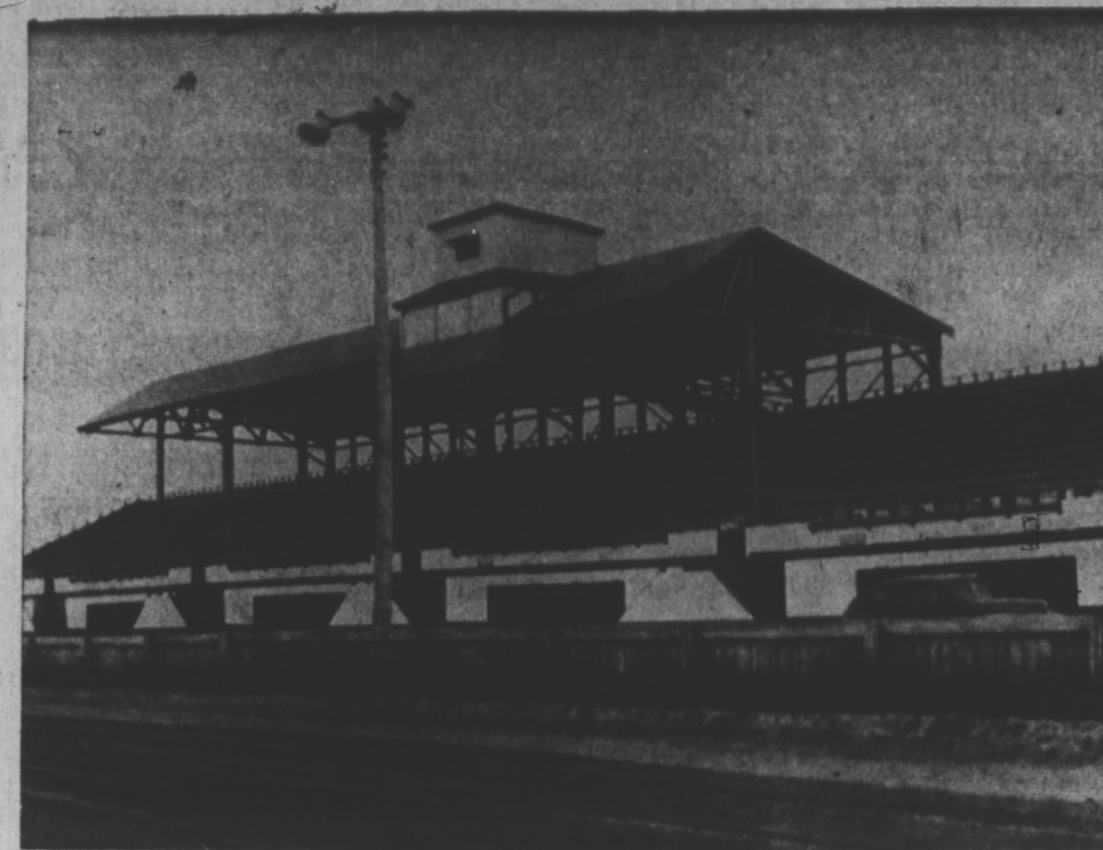

RACEWAY OPENS AGAIN

Punctured Left Eardrum Is Suffered By Patterson

NEW YORK (AP)—Floyd Patterson suffered a punctured left eardrum in his knockout defeat by Sweden's Ingemar Johansson last Friday, the former heavyweight champion told the New York Post Monday.

In an interview with Post columnist Milton Gross, Patterson said a punch to the ear apparently aggravated a slight injury he had suffered before.

Physicians say such an injury, unless infectious, could be cleared up within two weeks. Patterson said he slept most of Saturday, after losing his title to Johansson Friday night, except for a short session at home with the doctor.

He was outfoxed. In discussing his third-round knockout loss to the surprising Swede, Patterson told Gross: "He's a thinking fighter. He outfoxed me. He tricked me before that right and I shouldn't have let myself be tricked. I was fooled by him."

"It looked to me like he was fighting a defensive fight, only a defensive fight. He was pushing out that left jab only to keep me off, I thought, and he didn't hit me with it at all, at least I don't remember feeling it."

"And it was nothing. He was just sticking it out, kind of flicking it. By the second round neither one of us had done anything. I was expecting the crowd to boo us, and I hate to hear the crowd boo, me or the other fighter. I figured I had to do something. I hit him a couple of good hooks, but nothing much."

MORE AGGRESSIVE "In the third round I was more aggressive. I was waiting

for him to do something with that right hand. Three times before when he stuck out the jab I found myself moving straight to his right hand. I was right in line with it. Three times he didn't do anything about throwing the right at all. I kept thinking maybe he doesn't have a right. Maybe that's why he never used it in training."

"It looked to me that he'd had the chance, but hadn't done anything about it. It looked to me like he'd be willing to go 15 rounds that way and that's how I made my mistake. I was careless. The next time he let the left go I wasn't even watching his right. All I was watching was the left. After the left I moved in just as I'd done before and that's when he caught me. The right followed the left and I was right there."

THE RETURN How about the return bout? "The next time," said Patterson, "I'm not saying I'm going to beat him, but I'll be different from the other night. I won't be tricked again. All he was waiting for was the chance to land that right. If I was smarter Friday night I would have backed up every time he pushed out the jab. He'd have had to come to me then instead of me coming

to him."

Did you think it could happen, Gross asked. "Anything can happen," Floyd said. "But I didn't think it would. I wanted so badly to win this one. I guess I was too confident, maybe a little overconfident."

Says Hoyt: "Babe Ruth is the only man I ever saw who got a home run out in the infield fly. The Yankees were playing the Boston Red Sox and there was a strong wind blowing in from left field. The left fielder, the third baseman, the shortstop and the centre fielder all raced for a pop fly Babe hit. We thought the ball had been boomed out of a cannon. The thing kept climbing and climbing while Ruth kept racing around the bases. Finally, the ball started to come down. I guess Babe was almost to third by this time. In 'travelling' for the ball everybody was jostling everybody else and the ball touched nobody while Ruth scored. It was the funniest home run he hit in his whole career."
