The shores of Finland are now the theatre of Admiral Napier's operations. It is probable that the fate of the war will be decided here; for if the Anglo-French fleets, aided by expeditionary troops, succeed in taking the fortress situated in that part of the Baltic Sea, the Czar Nicholas will be forced, in spite of his pride, to accept conditions of peace dictated by the Western powers.

The inhabitants of Finland long belonged to Sweden. But the Russians from the time of Peter I. invaded one province after another, and the whole country was annexed to Russia by the treaty of 1809.

The emperor Alexander expressly promised that the religion and fundamental laws, the rights and privileges of the principality should be respected; and engaged to acknowledge the national Diet regularly for the voting of taxes and local legislation. But these fair promises have not been executed.
