that the screening would be helped by publicity about the number of employees affected. Information of that nature had been given out twice. In 1950 the government said three employees of the National Film Board had been dismissed after a check of some 580 persons, when there was doubt about security in the board. The only other occasion was when the government confirmed what was public knowledge that two employees of the National Research Council had been convicted under the Official Secrets Act and dismissed. There had been no other prosecutions.

STATEMENT SOUGHT
 Mr. St. Laurent entered the debate after Mr. Fulton asked Justice Minister Garson several times for a statement of government policy. Mr. Garson did not reply, except to say he disagrees with Mr. Fulton.

Mr. Fulton agreed that the government has the ultimate responsibility for security among employees. He urged, however, establishment of a board of review which would hear the employee's side of the case before a final decision was made.

"It is dangerous to leave the people of Canada in the dark as to the effectiveness of the government's screening methods," said Mr. Fulton.

LOCAL CADET CORPS PRESENT FINE APPEARANCE ON INSPECTION

"It is a privilege to wear a uniform, but it is a special privilege when that uniform is of one of the Canadian Armed Forces," said Brigadier W. W. Reid, D.S.O., E.D., when he addressed the Cadet Corps of City Schools yesterday.

The inspection of Prince Street Cadet Corps took place at 10.30 a.m.; West Kent at 2.30 p.m. and Queen Square at 7.00 p.m. The morning inspection was favored by good weather but in the afternoon and evening heavy rain turned the parade ground at Memorial Field into a muddy surface. The weather did not seriously detract from the splendid performance put on by the cadets.

Brigadier Reid was accompanied on the inspection by Area Cadet Training Officer Lieutenant T. Allen of Halifax and by the Commanding Officers of the units with which the various corps are affiliated. Prince Street and West Kent are attached to the 5 Div. Signals whose C/O is Lt. Col. K. M. Johnston, E.D., and Queen Square is affiliated with the P.E.I. Recce. Regiment, C/O Lt. Col. A. W. Rogers, E.D.

At the inspection the ceremonial drill consisted of General Salute, inspection by Brig. W. W. Reid; march past in close column of platoon; march past in close column of route, and advance in review order. Demonstrations were given in company drill, Bren gun, first aid, map reading, signalling, rifle P.T., and precision drill by the girls of West Kent Cadet Corps. The girls platoon gave a fine account of themselves and were very

colorful in their blue berets, white blouses and blue skirts.

Prizes Distributed
 Prizes were given by the affiliated Regiment of each Corps and the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion very generously donated \$25 to each school to be distributed as seen fit by the cadet instructors. Comrade Harry Morgan, M.M. Secretary Whiston Smith and President Stanley Bryant represented the Legion at the morning, afternoon and evening respectively.

As the inspecting officers moved among the cadets in their demonstrations, the ready answers given to their questions indicated how well the boys had been trained. Brigadier Reid gave brief addresses at the close of each inspection and congratulated the cadets upon their fine turnout. He told them that every boy and girl should feel it their duty to learn something about defending their country if and when the need should arise. He paid high tribute to the instructors who worked so painstakingly to bring the cadet training

CHURCHILL: A Man and an Era

In Oct. 1951, Churchill was elected to head the British government. He was 70 and those observers were sure that he wanted victory, not office.

But he had many things to do. Early in 1953 he met with President-elect Dwight Eisenhower in New York to reestablish his international footing. He was already preparing for a U. S.-Britain meeting with Malenkov of Russia.

 Then back to England to claim the crown's reward and assist in the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. It marked the fifth reign through which he had been a world-renowned figure.

But it was his own tired body that stood in the way of a Big Three meeting. Perhaps, as he said, sitting before fires was not for him. But in 1953 it appeared that history was taking its own path and he was too infirm to follow. Under the advice of his physicians, he took a rest.
