WHILE VINT, the pedestrian, was driving to his farm at Huntington, L. I., on Friday last, his horse ran away with him. Vint was severely shaken up, the horse was badly injured, and the wagon was wrecked.

At a fire in Orangeville recently, the well known trotting horse General Beamish was fatally burned before he could be rescued. A short time before the accident occurred, his owners had been offered \$3,000 for him.

MR. FRASER, Secretary of the Ottawa Iron and Steel Company, has returned from England after six months absence. He reports that he has succeeded in organizing a company with a capital of \$350,000 to commence operations this fall.

C. C. GREGORY, Esq., with characteristic generosity has contributed the sum of \$100 towards the Bazaar in aid of the Bishop's house. Mr. Gregory's many friends will be pleased to learn that his estimable lady is improving fast in health.

A MAN named McLEOD, who arrived from the United States last evening, left by morning train to visit his parents at St. Peter's. After securing his ticket at that place, he found that two hundred and sixty dollars in greenbacks had disappeared from his pocket. Search was made at the station, in the train and among the passengers, but the money up to the present has not been found.

SIR HERBERT LANGEVIN, C. B., K. C. M. G., Minister of Public Works, and family arrived in St. John by the I. C. R., from Moncton Wednesday evening. The party proceeded to Halifax this morning, and will go north after a short stay there. Sir Hector visited the St. John Cotton Factory, Exhibition Buildings and grounds, etc., in company with Hon. T. R. Jones, Sheriff Harding, J. H. Parks, Esq., and other prominent citizens.

LORD SUPREMY is building a large jam manufactory on his estate at Taddington, in Gloucestershire. Two years ago he planted there 33,000 roseberry trees, 167,000 black currant, 20,000 plum, 9,000 damson, 3,000 apple, 10,000 red currant, 25,000 raspberry, 900 pear, 500 cherry, 100 cobnut, and 52 acres were planted with strawberries. At the same time 100 Scotch firs and 10,000 poplars were planted for sheltering purposes.

Cholera in Egypt.

LONDON, Aug. 4. The London Daily News, referring to the terrible ravages of the cholera plague in Egypt, estimates the number of victims to be over a seven thousand. The News also stated that the general health in England was very good.

DeLesseps' Compromises.

LONDON, Aug. 4. M. DeLesseps has expressed his willingness to re-open the Suez Canal negotiations on more liberal terms than formerly proposed. It is probable that the Government will re-consider their determination not to lay the matter before the house this session.

A Landing Prevented.

DUBLIN, Aug. 4. Dublin informers on board the steamer "Putham" were prevented from landing at Adelaide.

Franco-Chinese Negotiations.

PARIS, Aug. 4. Negotiations between France and China have again been terminated. China accuses France with wanting to quarrel, making its pretext the annexation of Tonquin. A Monarchical plot has been discovered in the city.

The Turf.

LONDON, Aug. 4. At Goodwood to-day the race for the Molecombe stakes for two-year-olds was won by the filly Latoppe.

Clifford Lloyd.

LONDON, Aug. 4. Mr. Trevelyn stated in the House of Commons this afternoon that Clifford Lloyd has not yet resigned his post of Magistrate in Ireland as was reported.

An Award.

OTTAWA, August 4. It is stated that the Intercolonial Claims Commissioners have awarded John J. McDonald and Alexander McDonald \$49,000 in full settlement of their claims.

A French Plot.

LONDON, August 4. A despatch from Paris says a plot to restore the monarchy has been discovered.

An Attempt to blow up a Scotch Factory.

LONDON, August 4. A box of dynamite to which a lighted fuse was attached, has been discovered in a large linen factory at Cupar Fife, Scotland. It was extinguished before it reached the explosives. The attempt to blow up the factory is attributed to Fenianism. Great excitement prevails.

Cholera in Egypt.

LONDON, Aug. 3. The Daily News asserts that the total deaths from Cholera in Egypt has been 16,000.

Telegraph Notes.

Emperor William has directed this four hundredth birthday of Martin Luther to be observed by all Protestant schools.

The journeyman cooper in all the shops in the northern part of St. Louis, number between two and three hundred, struck on the 2nd for an advance of wages.

The British government's bill to centralize hospital management in the event of an outbreak of cholera in London passed its first reading in the House of Commons on the 2nd.

True bills have been found against prisoners held at Liverpool for being concerned in the dynamite plot. They are charged with treason, felony and conspiracy to murder and to destroy public buildings.

King Humbert visited the hospitals in Naples on the 2nd, and spoke separately to all of the sufferers. A man aged 80 years, with four children and two youths, were exhumed alive in Ischia on the 2nd.

It has been ascertained that several refugees from Alexandria lost their lives at Casamatocia. The Cologne Gazette reports several German artists killed in the disaster. Some papers estimate that 8,000 persons perished on the island.
