ARBOR DAY AT SHERWOOD. - During the past week the Directors of Sherwood Cemetery have, with the assistance of Mr. Noah Harper, the veteran tree planter, set out some fifty trees on the meadow on each side of the central roadway in the Cemetery. They are a splendid collection of the best ornamental trees, and consist of limes, elms, acacias, Norway spruces, white and rock maples, chestnut, sycamores, beech, birch, wild cherry, ash, sycamore, English oak, and last, and we may say rarest, Island oak. Sherwood is a beautiful spot, and if these trees grow, as they certainly should, they will in time make a magnificent avenue, and add much to the adornment of the Cemetery. It is to be hoped that visitors will take care not to injure them in any way. The directors have also engaged the services of Mr. Harper to plant a spruce hedge along the roadway from the gate to the rear of the keeper's cottage, and to make other improvements to add to the attractions of Sherwood during the summer. We are pleased to learn that some plant-holders have planted some very handsome trees and shrubs in their lots, and that more of this work is in contemplation.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.
VOTES IN SUPPLY
OTTAWA, May 23.
At yesterday's session Mr. Bergeron was unanimously appointed Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons.
The House in committee of supply, - the opposition took objection to the vote for salary of Mr. Perley, Chief Engineer of Public Works, on account of his alleged connection with McGreevy charges, but the item finally passed. The opposition urged the suspension of Mr. Perley. Sir John Macdonald said he would resign before he would consent to Mr. Perley's suspension.
The vote for the High Commissioner's office brought up a discussion of Sir Charles taking part in elections. The opposition were very indignant. The vote passed on division.
Seward, who was not present at Wednesday's division, voted with the Government, thus settling his political allegiance.
Good progress was made in supply before the adjournment.
Messrs. Macdonald and McLean have had an interview with the Minister of Railways, urging the enlargement of the head Railway Station at Charlottetown.
Mr. Laurier was in attendance for a short time yesterday. He is still looking very ill.
Sir John was on hand all day, in excellent health and spirits, and remained until adjournment at 11 o'clock.
Many members have left town for a holiday. Mr. McLean has gone to Portland; Messrs. Perry and Yeo to Boston.
THE IRISH LAND BILL,
An Important Amendment.
Hope for the Tenants.
LONDON, May 23.
Speaking at a League meeting last night, Mr. Parnell said that in the acceptance of the new clause in the Land Bill lay the ultimate solution of the Irish Land Question. Though a Conservative measure, and though it was given through a man who had disgraced his tenure of office, it was a good clause. If driven from public life for supporting it, he would cheerfully yield, being convinced that it was among the greatest services that had ever fallen to his lot to render to Ireland.
Hardly twenty per cent. of the members were present on the opening of the House of Commons yesterday.
Mr. Balfour has virtually altered the character of his land bill. Originally it applied thirty million pounds, advanced from the imperial exchequer, to enable a transfer of the larger holdings, to the advantage of the great landlords and well-to-do farmers. Balfour's clause first proposed that the greater part of the purchase money be advanced on the holdings under thirty pounds.
Parnell estimated that the alteration would enable one hundred and fifty thousand tenants to come under the provisions of the bill, who would otherwise have been excluded.
The official statistics show that 92 per cent. of the whole tenantry pay less than thirty per cent.
Under pressure of the Ulster members, Mr. Balfour has consented to substitute fifty pounds as the limit, the number of tenants paying between thirty and fifty pounds, being only seven per cent. of the whole. The transformed bill passed in committee.
