CHILDREN FOR CANADA.—The steamer Circassian, which is rived at Rimouski on Saturday morning last, has among her passengers forty-three boys and girls, ranging from four to eighteen years of age, sent out from London by Cardinal Manning, for distribution in the Province of Quebec.—Halifax Chronicle.

A YOUNG boy, the only son of Antoine Boudreau, of Aboungan, a few miles from Shediac, recently came to his death under very peculiar circumstances. The boy followed his father to the woods, and is supposed to have got lost. In the thunder storm of the 19th the dead body of the lost boy was brought to the surface of the pond at Black's Mill.—Sun.

EDWARD WHELAN, of Little York, yesterday became insane, and with axe in hand almost gutted the interior of his farm house afterwards burned his children's and wife's clothing, and then threatened the lives of his family. He was securely bound with ropes and brought to this city, and by Alex. Hayden, Esq., J. P., committed to jail to await admission to Falconwood Asylum.

VENOR AND THE WEATHER.—Montreal, July 20.—The following are the revised predictions of Mr. Venor for the remainder of July:—21st, warm and fair, cool nights; 22nd and 23rd, high rain storms in many parts of Canada and the United States; 24th, Sunday, hot and windy; 25th, oppressive and stormy weather; 26th, heavy rain storms and winds; 27th and 28th, cloudy and cooler weather, with cold nights and cold showers; 29th, cool and showery; 30th and 31st, warmer and high winds with rain showers.

THE QUEEN'S PRIZE.—A despatch from Wimbledon of the 19th inst., states that for some time during the competition for the Queen's Prize at the Rifle meeting it seemed highly probable that one of the Canadian team, Sergeant Walker, would carry off the gold medal and £250 presented by Her Majesty. He was among six others who had an aggregate of fifty-six over the two first ranges, that being the highest on the register. He rather fell off at 1,000 yards, though his chances of success were brilliant at the first two or three shots, he finished with seventy-five, which falls into the tenth place, being eleven less than the winner, who made three points more than was ever known in the history of the competition and twelve more than was made last year. The name of the winner is Private Beck. He belongs to the Third Regiment of Devon Volunteers. His score was eighty six.

An idea of the magnitude of the undertaking of the Canada Pacific Syndicate is afforded by the fact that at a recent meeting of the shareholders the issue of \$25,000,000 of bonds was authorized. If, as the Grip papers claimed, the Syndicate can build the road out of the money subsidy and the sale of a small portion of the lands granted to them, why this early issue of Twenty-five Millions of Dollars of bonds? Why this immense loan? This immense mortgage on the future earnings and the property of the company, collectively and as individual shareholders? Surely there has been some mistake somewhere. If, as Mr. Blake claims, the Syndicate is getting values for \$101,000,000 from the Government, and still have to make arrangements at the outset for borrowing \$25,000,000 more, the people of Canada may congratulate themselves on getting rid of the elephant.—Moncton Times.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

St. Petersburg, July 21.

It is stated that the Nihilist student who suicided recently in the cemetery here was revived by the doctors so that he could converse, and that he informed Baronoff, chief of police, that he was one of a party of twenty sworn to assassinate the Czar, but his courage failed on the day (13th July), and he shot himself. He revealed the names of nineteen conspirators, and all were arrested. The student lived until the 18th.

London, July 21.

The Telegraph's Paris despatch says the tone of bitterness lately assumed by the Ministerial press towards Turkey has culminated in a violently hostile article in the Republique Francaise, professing great apprehension in regard to the action of the Porte in Tripoli, and not only attributing to the Sultan the desire to stir up Mussulman fanaticism on the frontier and in the interior of Tunis, but directly charging him with keeping agents there for that purpose.

The News Constantinople despatch says there is a generally credited rumor that Midhat Pasha attempted suicide by opening his veins with a scissor. He declared he was determined to prove that suicide could be committed that way.

The Telegraph's Constantinople special says the Porte has instructed the Governor of Tripoli to prevent any Turks from joining the Arabs.

The House of Commons, in committee, took up the Land Bill and Mr. Forster's clause providing for the application of land to the building of cottages for laborers was added to the bill. He explained that it was not intended to give permanence of tenure. What was wanted was to give cottages to those employed on the land. Other clauses, moved by Mr. Forster, giving power to the courts on application for determination of judicial rent to impose conditions as to laborers' cottages, and providing that the land commission shall make yearly reports to the Viceroy was also added to the bill.

Arthur Lefroy, accused of murder on the Brighton Railway, has been committed for trial.

The funeral of Dean Stanley is fixed for Monday next.

Lord Colin Campbell and Miss Gertrude Blood were married to-day, at the Chapel Royal in Savoy. The Princess Louise and Duke of Argyll were present. The Bishop of Kentucky assisted at the ceremony.

St. Petersburg, July 21.

The Czar has granted the petition of Henny Helfmann, the woman convicted of complicity in the assassination of the late Czar, and commuted the sentence of death to penal servitude for life.

Vienna, July 21.

The Sultan of Morocco has appealed to the Sultan of Turkey to put a stop to the agitation in Northern Africa, lest insurrection result in the expulsion of himself from the throne of Morocco and the complete separation of the Barbary States from Turkish hegemony. It is stated that these representations have produced a profound impression at Constantinople.

London, July 21.

Reports of a serious hitch in the negotiations of the Transvaal commission are untrue. The draft of the convention had been submitted to the Boers, and was favorably received, with the exception of twelve clauses, which it was expected would be modified.

UNITED STATES.

Washington, D. C., July 21.

The Emperor of Austria, through his Charge d'Affaires has sent President Garfield his warm congratulations upon his hopeful condition and again expresses deep indignation at the attempted assassination.

Des Moines, Iowa, July 21.

The army worm is making terrible havoc in the oat fields of Iowa and in large areas the crop will fall short of the seed planted.

Chicago, July 21.

Severe thunder storms, with much damage to crops and other property, are reported from various parts of this State and Indiana.

The summary of the work of the army worm in this state shows that the territory just north of the centre of the State and extending eastward to the eastern boundary has been ravaged. In Michigan, the worm has appeared in several counties.

Deadwood, D. T., July 21.

The opening out of the Caledonia mine at Terra Valle, caved in last night, burying seven miners. Three were taken out alive, four are supposed to be killed.

Washington, July 21.

Havana advices state that during the week ending July 16, there were sixteen deaths from yellow fever, the number of cases being about 110. The shipping at Santiago de Cuba has been invaded by yellow fever. Sagua La Grande is also reported as being infected.

Havana, July 21.

Small pox is raging in St. Domingo to a fearful extent. Parties are daily organized to help to bury the victims.
