Fire Damages Masonic Temple At Montague

The Masonic Temple at Montague was completely gutted by fire early yesterday morning before it was finally brought under control.

The fire, of unknown origin, was first noticed by Mr. Peter Clary at 5:10 a. m. as he was on his way to the High School. He immediately sounded the alarm, and the firemen and equipment were soon on the scene.

It was determined that the fire began directly behind the staircase leading to the lodge rooms on the second floor, and quickly spread to the office of Hyndman and Co. on the west end, and to the office of Maritime Electric at the centre of the building. The office of the Montague Electric at the east received only smoke and water damage.

While the main hose was being hooked up, the firemen, under Fire Chief Murray Johnston, took the chemical into the building, but the fire had gained such headway that they were able to hold it for only a short time. For three hours the firemen fought the blaze before it was brought under control. The west and central portions of the building were completely ruined, and damage is unofficially estimated at \$3,000.00 partially covered by insurance.

On January 20, 1950, the building was also gutted by fire leaving only the outer brick shell. This fire was also of unknown origin, and caused approximately \$10,000.00 damage.

It was completely rebuilt the next year, and occupied in June of 1950.

The office equipment of Hyndman and Co., and part of the office equipment of the Maritime Electric was saved.

It was announced that the building would be reconstructed as soon as possible.
