"I love you both," said Nordin his arms around both ladies as a newspaper reporter took their picture. Miss Goetz told the reporter never to ask a lady her age. Then Miss Goetz recalled her host as a school boy—"a nice little kid. I remember him as if it were yesterday singing at the Christmas program and his father sitting there looking so proud." She bowed her head. Then, in the midst of a smile Miss Goetz died.

Toronto Stocks

TORONTO (CP) — Prices rebounded from their lows near the close of trading today but the stock market had to settle for a moderate decline. All indices were lower. All mining groups were lower with senior base metals and uranium having two losses to each gain and copper and junior base metals three declines to every advance. A lower copper price on the world market reduced copper early in the session and the selling spread to the other mining sections. Losses, however, were generally confined to 15 cents and there were a few gains ranging to 25 cents. Western oils moved lower in a 15-cent range although Canadian Williston lost 30 cents at \$2.30 in light trading. Canadian Devonian featured, jumping 70 cents to a new high of \$8.10. Index losses: Industrials .77 to 433.40; gold, 12 1/2 to 75.95; base metals 22 to 206.54; western oils .79 to 161.76.
