New I.M.T. Bus Given Trial Run

A new streamlined bus, which cost almost \$19,000 goes into service on Island runs today for the Island Motor Transport Company. Two more similar buses are expected by the local company in the near future.

The blue and yellow bus is a thirty-seven passenger Currier Coach, and is a product of the International motor in the rear. Each of the thirty-two individual seats are of the reclining type. The bus is built for smooth and comfortable travelling, and compares very favorably with those found in larger centres of Canada and the United States.

Interior of the bus is finished in shades of green and grey with chrome trim. Entire floor is covered with green battisette linoleum, and the seats are in a dark green soft pile material. Small luggage racks are above the passengers' heads, and larger luggage is stored in compartments which open on the outside of the bus along the side.

A trial run of the bus was made by Mr. Ray Stull, manager of the I. M. T., yesterday afternoon, on which he was accompanied by various government and city officials. Among those who enjoyed the tryout were Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare; Mr. P. Murnaghan, deputy Minister of Industry and Natural Resources; His Worship Mayor B. WINNIPEG, Nov. 14 - (CP) - Oats and barley future prices showed firmness on Winnipeg Grain Exchange today. The December and May barley futures reached seasonal highs during the session.

Aggressive commercial demand was evident, and there was some buying of oats and barley by United States interests. Offerings of the December contract were light, especially in barley.

The rye trade was mostly local, with some American selling. Fairly liberal hedging sales appeared in flux. The offers were absorbed by processors and local buyers.

Export wheat allocations included 265,000 bushels for the United Kingdom and 200,000 for Belgium. Class two and I. W. A. wheat prices dropped 3/4 cent across the board.

TB Christmas Seal Campaign To Open

The Christmas Seal campaign of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League officially opens on Monday. This is its sole drive to raise the funds it needs to continue its operations for the next year.

The Christmas Seal principle is familiar to most residents of this Province; some may even remember each of the 24 annual seals the Canadian Tuberculosis Associations have put out. Each year it is of course of different design. They all have the same purpose, to remind the public that unfortunately TB is still striking down victims, and that measures for prevention must be taken.

By far the largest part of the campaign consists of mailing these Seals to householders throughout the Island. In the two cities the larger firms and businesses are personally solicited by voluntary canvassers.

In Charlottetown this year the canvassing teams are made up from members of service clubs, Gyro, Rotary, Kinsmen, Kiwanis, as well as the executive of the League.
