**Award-Winning Holsteins Sparked By Lea Breeding**

I'm just back from a week's vacation which took me through a large part of New Brunswick and to the south of Maine, and I feel out of touch with recent farm happenings here, though I'm going to keep close to the action that will be developing this week at meetings to choose producer members for the new Potato marketing board. Indications a few weeks ago were that there might be some keen behind-the-scenes activity in the effort to choose "suitable" producer members.

The farther south I went in Maine the farther the season seemed ahead of ours — it appeared to be about two weeks anyway, though the Maine people told me that their spring is late there also.

I know that potatoes have been planted here several weeks ago but so far as I could learn last night, little grain has been sown on Prince Edward Island.

Actually I have no details on the Maine cropping program, either. I went there on a mission concerned with my "Across the Island" column. I'm trying to get that story ready for this week.

It is a bit unusual, even for that column which is devoted almost entirely to unusual items.  
A recent release from the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada is interesting in that it credits the breeding policy of the late Walter M. Lea of Victoria — he was a former Prince Edward Island Premier — with a big assist in the feat of Edward Dickie, Truro, N.S. who received his Master Breeder Shield this year.

Mr. Dickie is the fifth Maritime Holstein breeder to receive the coveted Master Breeder shield since J. Walter Jones and Mr. Jones, also a former Premier, and later Senator, was the first private breeder in Canada to merit the award.

The Holstein headquarters release explains, though, that the present (Dickie) herd owes much of its greatness to a group of animals bred by Hon. Walter M. Lea of Victoria, P.E.I. Included in this three-generation group of cows was Colantha Dixie Posch classified "Excellent", her daughter Dixie Posch Tycoon, classified "Very Good" and her daughter, Dixie Mande Tycoon, classified "Excellent", the plains.

"The latter animal", the release adds, "has a lifetime production of over 184,000 pounds of milk and is part of a six-generation family in the Dickie herd, all of which are classified 'Excellent', and that of course, is the top classification for conformation."

"Purchased, at the same time as the family mentioned above, was Inglede Francy, a 'Very Good' cow, of very similar breeding to the others. She was a 12-year-old at the time and only a three-quarter cow but she has exerted a great influence through her descendants in the Dickie herd and her influence has spread through the 'Martimes', the headquarters release adds.

Incidentally the other Island breeders to merit the Master Breeder award are Colby C. Lewis, Freeborn and Cyril Jones, Pownal.

Mr. Jones received his award several years ago. Mr. Lewis, who is now associated with his son Edwin, in the farming operation, merited the top award some years previously.

For today's off-beat story I'm reminded of the arm-chair City farmer who was planning "a money-making idea." He called his nearest department of agriculture fieldman and said "I'd buy the animals as heifers in the fall and sell them as steers the following year," he told the flabbergasted agriculture representative.

**New Alarm System Is Based On Fail-Safe Principle**

WINNIPEG (CP) — A Winnipeg-based firm has developed an alarm system it claims could save millions of dollars for manufacturers and insurance companies.

Remote Industrial Music and Controls Ltd. has cut costs by providing simultaneously a 24-hour warning service against fire, burglary and any type of mechanical failure on a single set of leased lines.

On the same lines the firm provides an outboard combination of "storing" motivational music, usually interspersed with any commercials the client wishes, and a conference communications arrangement enabling store headquarters to communicate with each or all of its branches.

RIMAC President Ross Heald, 48, says the alarm is completely "fail-safe."

Most alarm systems complete an electrical circuit in an alarm situation. If there is a mechanical failure in the alarm, it does not go off.

**TRANSMITS FULL TIME**  
RIMAC's system inverts the procedure. It transmits a signal at all times. "If any part of the system fails, it falls into the alarm state," Mr. Heald said.

To prevent false alarms, the RIMAC system is redundant—that is, two circuits perform the alarm function and the central station considers the signal a circuit breakdown unless it receives two alarms.

In the eight months of operation, Mr. Heald said he has not yet had an alarm failure or a false alarm.

The other RIMAC service—broadcasting motivational music to retail stores and other clients — can increase retail sales by an estimated 5 1/2 per cent, Mr. Heald says. But it is also used by large office buildings.

**STILL GROWING**  
The company, with assets of about \$35,000 just five years ago, has burgeoned to the dimensions of a \$500,000 firm and is growing like an adolescent.

Plans include expansion into Eastern Canada and this is one reason Mr. Heald says he chose centrally-located Winnipeg for his head office. Another reason, he said, is the favorable labor market here.

RIMAC's research department is still busy, too. Mr. Heald mentioned a newly-developed system of constantly adjusting the volume of store music to store noise level. The trick is for the volume control to "hear" all noises but the music.

The new device is nicknamed NOVAC for noise-operated volume amplifier control, and is already installed in a large Winnipeg chain grocery store.
