LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

The Shortest and Best Route via Cape Traverse and Tormentine.

SIR,—In a short time the Dominion Parliament will assemble. I feel it a duty to call the attention of our representatives, both Dominion and local, also the editors of our local papers, and the public generally, to the great necessity there is for the extension of our pier here so as to give the public good harbor accommodations. The Government ought to bring down in their estimates a sum sufficient for this work; for they are aware of the amount required to give a fine harbor here from the estimates laid before them by able engineers.

The contract, too, ought to be let as soon as possible, as the work can be performed very much cheaper in winter than in summer. My reasons are for pressing this matter,—

First—It will be a great benefit to our farmers to have a harbor here, so that large vessels can come here to load with produce.

At present we have to charter small schooners to carry produce to larger vessels in other harbors. This causes an extra expense of from two to three cents a bushel. Consequently, the amount must come out of the farmer's pocket.

It must be apparent to every one that times are so dull that it is almost impossible for the poor farmer to get along, and they should have all the advantages it is possible for the Government to give them, and every accommodation required by them to get their produce marketed, should have the attention of our representatives, as what will benefit our farmers here will help every farmer directly or indirectly.

I would ask every farmer from Emerald Junction and all around this part of the country to Cape Traverse, to assist in bringing this matter before our representatives and the Government. It is our intention to call a public meeting soon, inviting our representatives, Dominion and local, to attend; and we want every farmer to assist in making this meeting a success.

We will have a petition and will pass strong resolutions, asking for our just rights and what has been promised us from time to time.

Second—Now that the pier is completed at Tormentine, N. B., and they have a splendid harbor there, a vessel drawing 20 feet of water can go in at low tide. It has cost about four hundred thousand dollars, (\$400,000) and it will be almost useless unless we get a harbor here, so as to make connection. We have to pay out four hundred part of that amount, and surely the Government will not refuse to vote thirty thousand (\$30,000) to give us a good harbor. I know that there are several plans and specifications before the Government, by able engineers, stating that it would cost about that amount to give us a fine harbor here, the N. B. and P. E. I. Railway Company will put on a fast steamer to connect the two points, and the Government would soon realize the amount of traffic it would bring to our railway.

Fourth—It would be a great advantage to the travelling public, in time and money. Just take a look at the time-tables. What do we find? Passengers leave Charlottetown now via Summerside at 7 o'clock a. m., and 6 o'clock, via Pictou. They arrive at Moncton by the Intercolonial at 14.45, and Truro at 20.05. What a difference there would be if the route were via Cape Traverse and Tormentine. A passenger would then leave Charlottetown at 9 o'clock a. m., and Summerside at 9.30, connect at Emerald Junction, and arrive at Sackville to connect with the noon C. P. R. train, and arrive in Halifax at 6 o'clock, one hour and forty-five minutes ahead of the passengers via Pictou. And the same advantage would be gained going west. Let a train leave Charlottetown at 4 o'clock p. m., and Summerside at 4.30 p. m., connect at Emerald Junction, arrive in Sackville to connect with the night train, passengers would go to Montreal and all points west on the same train as those who had crossed via Summerside in the morning, and would arrive in Halifax in the same train as passengers via Pictou! So, surely, the general public will see what a great advantage this route would be to the travelling public—as well as the advantage of quick mail service.

Let all who are opposed to this route just stop and think for one minute, and their consciences will tell them that this is the route. The Government should give the required harbor at once. There is a great number of people who would visit our Island if it was not for seasickness. Now, on this route they would not have time to get seasick. Just think, Mr. Editor, a steamer so fast as the Northumberland would take only 30 minutes to run from pier to pier! Let the government put on a fast train between here and Charlottetown, say to run 40 miles per hour. It would only take 2 hours and 30 minutes from Charlottetown to Sackville, N. B., the same time that the fastest boat can run from Summerside to Point du Chene. There was a through trip from Sackville to Charlottetown last summer, and with slow trains and slow host, the party was just 3 hours and 30 minutes making the trip—"not too bad!"

Hope Mr. Editor, you will take hold of this matter and assist us in obtaining what we have been promised for several years, especially before an election, I am, yours truly,

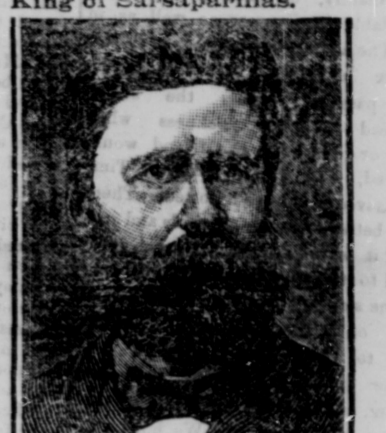
