She arrived within a few hundred yards of the buoy at Point du Chene, but owing to the density of the snow-storm prevailing at the time she was obliged to put to sea, and after knocking about in the Gulf the whole day and part of the night, reached Summerside in safety at 11.20 p. m., the same night. She left again this morning, on time, for Point du Chene.
