

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

ACKNOWLEDGMENT.—Collection of old linen, books and papers thankfully received at the P. E. Island Hospital from Miss Ada M. Lund, of Nine Mile Creek.

MORE IMPROVEMENTS.—The old houses at the end of West Street, near McLean's Foundry, have been taken away. This is a decided improvement to the locality.

ISLAND PRODUCE.—According to an exchange four cargoes of P. E. Island produce are now being distributed at Lunenburg. Potatoes are selling there at 38 and oats at 35.

THEY WANT INCORPORATION.—The election to decide upon the matter of incorporation for the town of Liverpool, N. S., took place on Saturday. A majority of 140 was declared in favor of incorporation.

THE EXPECTED HAPPENS.—The coroner's jury in the Nulty murder case at Rawdon, Que., on Saturday brought in a verdict of guilty against Tom Nulty, charged with murdering his two sisters and brother. He will be sent up for trial at Joliette.

An exchange of duties between the Canadian artillery stationed at Quebec and the British artillery at Halifax will be the following out of the experiment begun when the Canadian infantry company at Fredericton exchanged places with a detachment of the Berkshire Regiment in the garri on city. That the new move has been suggested may be taken as evidence that the first was considered a success. It will help to strengthen the feeling that while there are many sections under many different administrations, there is only one British army.

NEWSPAPERS AS TEXT BOOKS.—The introduction of newspapers as texts books in the public schools of Kansas City has attracted considerable attention among educationalists. A good newspaper is necessarily an educator. Itself the highest product of the scientific and mechanical resources of the century it may well be used as a text book. The columns teem with topics and its editorial page may suggest to the teachers of youth explanations of the events which are crowding one upon the other in this busy world. A newspaper of clean tone and high moral purpose cannot fail to broaden the minds of its readers.

NARROWLY ESCAPED DEATH.—James White, brakeman on Conductor Williams' special, had a narrow escape from death this morning at Brookfield, near St. John. Brakeman White was on the top of a box car putting on a brake, when he slipped on the frosty boards and fell between the cars. The train was moving slowly at the time and Mr. White's life was only saved by the brake beam catching him and pushing him ahead of the car. Mr. White was badly shaken up and was brought to Moncton and removed to his home on Lutz street in a cab. The extent of Mr. White's injuries are not yet ascertained.—Moncton Times.

AN OPEN LETTER

To Professor Saunders, of the Dominion Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

SIR,—I desire to make you acquainted with a proposition I made in the united counties of Leeds and Grenville three years ago. A poor farmer complained that the impoverished condition of the soil would oblige him to abandon the old homestead. I noticed on the farm a swamp flat—a rich deposit of vegetable decay of years. I suggested he might canal this and use it on the worn-out fields.

This man now is in comfortable circumstances and the swamp flat has borne two luxurious crops of barley. During my travels through the Counties of Carleton, Russell, Simcoe, Renfrew, Peel and Frontenac I noticed many farmers in the same situation, and who will give up their farms in despair to increase the already surplus band of unemployed who leave their places to better their condition in the cities and towns.

I find in the Province of Ontario a very frequent cause of farm desertion to be badly located ditches, defective drainage—the work of incompetent engineers who are not qualified for their positions.

I am of opinion that the Dominion Experimental Farm's usefulness might be improved by a staff of farm experts who would give the instruction and knowledge so essential to successful farming.
