He was Speaker of the House for five years from 1953-59.

In his lifetime Mr. Hessian was chairman of the board of school trustees; member of the town council; chairman of the finance committee; crown prosecutor; vice-president Kings County Boy Scouts; chairman of the Liberal executive; secretary of a health organization; Kings County member of the Board of Trade; chairman of a building committee, Montague High School.
