

Anniversary Items.

MONDAY, Sept. 22.—Sixty-four years ago, that earnest opposer of slavery, promoter of education, and legal reformer, Thomas Denman (created in 1834 a Baron of the United Kingdom) was Solicitor General to Queen Caroline, who married her cousin (George Prince of Wales, 1795) and against whom the famous Bill of Pains and Penalties was, by Lord Liverpool, brought into Parliament. He died on the 22nd of September, 1854.

Local and Other Items.

MONCTON is finding out and fining those who sell liquor illegally.

THE Shaw House, at Brackley Point Beach, will close on Friday next, the 26th inst.

THE wheat and oat crops along the West River seem excellent, and the farmers are busy harvesting.

LUCKIES are firm and higher in the London market, having sold at \$5.50 per case of four dozen. The supply is very light.

STIPENDIARY MAGISTRATE'S COURT, TO-DAY.—One assault case 50 cts; drunk \$2; Scott Act case postponed till this day week.

THE steamer Coban, of the Black Diamond Line, left Montreal for this port on Sunday, and is due here on Wednesday morning.

THE annual meeting of the Queen's County Rifle Association will be held in the City Court Room at eight o'clock this evening.

THE frost of last week has done great damage to the potato crop along the West River. In some cases a number of acres were totally destroyed.

A PUBLIC MEETING under the auspices of the Dairywomen's Association will be held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall on the first night of the Exhibition—the 8th of October.

FARMERS in the vicinity of Rocky Point complain of the ravages of a gang of apple-stealers. Mr. James Alcorn, of that place, had his orchard stripped completely on last Saturday night, and we also hear of a number of other cases of this kind in the same neighborhood. The gang should be caught and severely punished.

THE Rev. John Ellis, long and favorably known in the diocese as one of the most successful masters in a prominent school, and also as a diligent parish worker, has severed his connection with his East India work, and is now enjoying a vacation in the old country. It is expected that the rev. gentleman will soon return to Canada.—Church Guardian.

THE Mackenzie Government spent \$1,540,000 on immigration, and it secured for us exactly 92,700 immigrants. But the London Advertiser, a leading Grit organ, admitted that Canadians left the country for the United States, during the Mackenzie regime, at the rate of 23,000 per annum. Thus, under Mr. Mackenzie we gained 92,700 persons and lost 115,000. Deduct 92,700 from 115,000 and it will be seen that for our \$1,541,000 spent in bringing people to Canada, we secured not an addition to the population, but an actual loss of 22,700 souls.—Moncton Times.

THE CATTLE TRADE.—The Montreal Gazette has, with commendable enterprise, introduced a feature into its commercial reports, which must render of exceptionally great value to all persons engaged or interested in the cattle trade. The Gazette has for some time had a correspondent at Liverpool who sends weekly letters on the subject of cattle trade, and the letters have shown that the correspondent is remarkably well informed upon the subject, and must have exceptional facilities for obtaining precise and accurate information. To this has now been added a weekly cable letter on the position of the cattle market, which is published in the Gazette every Tuesday morning, giving the fullest particulars up to a late hour on Monday night.

The Canadian Contingent.

The following will give some idea of the work to be undertaken by the Canadian voyagers on the Nile: The first cataract is at Assouan, a distance of 700 miles from the mouth of the river, and the whole of this is navigable for boats of moderate draughts. The Nile cataracts are precisely similar to the rapids of the St. Lawrence and the Ottawa, and to be overcome by the same methods. The first cataract is rather a series of rapids than a fall, the entire descent in five miles being 80 feet, and the highest fall not exceeding six feet. In the whole distance between Khartoum and Assouan, about 800 miles, the river does not fall more than 1,100 feet. The natural fall of a wholly navigable river of the same distance would be 400 feet so that 700 feet may be said to represent the fall of the rapids. There are probably forty miles of rapids in the Nile. From the first to the second cataract is a distance of 200 miles; about the same distance separates the second from the third. Another 200 miles separates the third cataract from the fourth, while there is an interval of 150 miles between the fourth and fifth. Something more than that distance separates the fifth cataract from the sixth, which is a little more than 50 miles from Khartoum. There are 400 boats, which are from 30 to 32 feet in length, from 6 to 7 feet beam, and weighing less than 1,100 lbs. Each boat will contain two boatmen and 10 soldiers, one hundred days' supplies of food, draw when loaded only twenty inches of water, and be in every way complete in itself.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

General Gordon Wins two Victories

NEW YORK, Sept. 20. A despatch from Cairo says that a messenger from General Gordon has arrived at Dongola with the information that Gordon has had two severe battles with the rebels who were besetting Khartoum, in both of which the rebels sustained disastrous defeats. In the last battle when it became apparent that the rebels were giving way, Gen. Gordon sallied out, and so vigorous was his attack on the enemy that the latter were compelled to raise the siege of Khartoum and retreat.

Another Report.

LONDON, Sept. 20. Sir Evelyn Baring telegraphs from Cairo that the Mudir of Dongola has received advices from several sources to the effect that General Gordon has gained two great victories and that the siege of Khartoum was raised on August 30th—four days after General Gordon's last messenger left.

Remarkable Funeral.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21. The funeral of Jerry McAulay, ex-prize fighter, ex-highway robber, ex-river thief, ex-convict, and later a convert, took place to-day, and was attended by a remarkable assemblage, including, as it did, wealthy ladies and gentlemen, pick-pockets, sporting men, &c. McAulay was founder of the Water street and Central Missions.

Fatal Railway Accident.

TORONTO, Sept. 20. A bad smash up occurred on the Canadian Pacific on Saturday near Renfrew, the fireman was cut into pieces. His name was Eadier, the engineer was badly injured.

Dongola Cataract Reached.

LONDON, Sept. 21. The Sussex regiment of mounted infantry reached Dongola cataract with less difficulty than has been expected.

A Bombshell.

PESTH, Sept. 21. While the Synagogue was crowded to-day a bomb with a quick match was found at the entrance of the building.

Nationalist League Meeting.

DUBLIN, Sept. 20. The National League held a meeting yesterday at Ballinascree. Joseph M. Keany, M.P., in the course of his address said "The Irish members of the House of Commons opposed the Liberal Government because they respected more from the Conservatives." Resolutions were adopted in favor of independence and peasant proprietary. Mr. Parnell was cheered as the future Premier of Ireland.
