Report Says P.E.I. Causeway Can Be Built In 3 To 4 Years

The proposed P.E.I. - N.B. Causeway could be built in from three to four years and would pay for itself in 20 years, A.D. Margison and Associates Limited, Toronto, has told federal government officials.

It is understood the firm's plan calls for the federal government to pay the firm an amount equal to the cost of \$3,000,000 deficit on the Borden ferry service. The consulting firm would also collect tolls on vehicles using the causeway.

A source close to the provincial government said here yesterday the plan was received "not unfavorably" by federal officials. The engineering firm, whose president and general manager, A.D. Margison, is also president of the Island Development Company which bought the Charlottetown Hotel, is described in a book published by the firm as "one of the most completely equipped organizations in Canada for operations of varied sizes and complexities."

Listed among achievements of the firm are such structures as Halifax's bi-centennial drive entrance, The St. James Bridge and interchange in Winnipeg, the Kinmount Bridge in Ontario and highway design for Ontario bridges.

Rev. F.W.P. Bolger reiterated his stand, quoted yesterday in this paper, that Charlottetown, not Halifax, was the true cradle of confederation, when he addressed delegates to the Catholic Women's League national convention Thursday.

Speaking at the closing banquet at the Basilica Recreation Centre, Father Bolger, chairman of the University department, said Islanders can be proud that the idea of confederation originated here.

"The British-North America Act was drafted in clause at the Charlottetown conference in September, 1864. Its principles were agreed to by the Fathers of Confederation at that time. When they went to Quebec, all they had to do was ratify the resolutions already set out," Father Bolger said.

Bright Economic Future Seen For Atlantic Area

An optimistic outlook for the economic future of the Atlantic region has been voiced here by G. Ronald Latham, British Trade Commissioner in the Atlantic Provinces.

Mr. Latham, here on an initial visit with government officials and businessmen in the province, said in an interview there is a "great deal of interest and confidence that these four provinces have begun a steady march forward economically."

The Atlantic Provinces are moving towards economic strength equal to the rest of Canada, he stated.

United Kingdom government and businessmen were keenly aware of this surge of economic growth, and an indication of their awareness was their decision to build a permanent residence for the trade commission in Halifax.

Previous to this, commission officials lived in rented, furnished accommodations.

JUMPING-OFF PLACE

Britain regards the Atlantic Provinces as a "jumping-off place" for the development of commercial and industrial interests, the Sheffield-born commissioner said.

Two reasons Mr. Latham gave for the interest of British businessmen in the Atlantic were the close ties of the provinces with Britain, and their geographical proximity to the U.K.

He added that the Maritime Provinces, "on the edge of a tremendous volume of population," formed a "jumping-off spot" for the Atlantic region.

Britain was seeking to correct an imbalance of trade between it and Canada, Mr. Latham said, and this involved encouraging businessmen to look to Eastern Canada as a market for an increase in British exports.
