COLD STORAGE.

As a result of the large meeting on Saturday evening and the information afforded by Mr. Horace Hazard, through his correspondence with the Minister of Agriculture and Professor Robertson, a strong committee was appointed to carry the matter a step further.

AGAINST CANADIANS.

United States Immigration Bill Has Passed the Senate—No Canadian Cases After July Next, Do Any Work Across the Border.

According to a recent despatch from Washington the immigration bill, as it passed Congress, extends the homestead restrictions again. "All persons physically capable and over sixteen years of age, who cannot read and write the English language or some other language, but a person not so able to read and write who is over fifty years of age, and who is the parent or grandparent of a child or grandchild over twenty years of age, similarly qualified and capable, and a wife or man or child not so able to read or write may accompany or be sent for and come to join the husband or parent similarly qualified and capable."

For the purpose of testing the immigrant's literary ability, he is compelled to read and write from twenty to twenty-five words of the United States constitution.

Section 4.—That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any male alien who has not in good faith made his declaration before the proper court of his intention to become a citizen of the United States or to come regularly or habitually into the United States by land or water, for the purpose of engaging in any mechanical trade or manual labor for wages or salary, returning from time to time to his foreign country.

THE HOME HELPERS.

Lady Aberdeen Defines the Object of the Order.

To the Editor of The Examiner: Sir,—At a public meeting held in Ottawa on Wednesday, February 10, at the instance of the National Council of Women of Canada, under the presidency of His Excellency the Governor General, the following resolution was unanimously passed, having been moved by the Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of the Dominion, and seconded by the Hon. Clifford Sifton, Minister of the Interior.

The standard for this examination and the tests to be undergone will be prescribed by medical men and others who understand the need which has to be met. It is proposed that the co-operation of various hospitals and medical men in different parts of Canada be invited in carrying out this examination so that there may be convenient centres for all candidates.

Trained nurses who may desire to enter the Order will be made very welcome. They will have to pass the examination and be personally approved by the Committee.

Women who have already lived in the country districts, and who are respected and have the confidence of their neighbors would be preferable to any other instances, and it would be well to encourage parishes and townships to choose some one whom they know and send her down to one of the centres, where the necessary training could be given.

Districts wanting to secure the services of a Home Helper will be required to raise a certain sum towards her maintenance, which will be undertaken to give yearly to the Central Committee during her residence, or to provide suitable board and lodging for her and means of conveyance. On application to the Central Committee a suitable Helper will be selected for the district applying, and a grant would be given toward her expenses to meet the sum raised by the district, and her salary would be paid by the Central Committee.

All arrangements should be made so that it should be considered as honor to belong to this Order and that the members of it should be regarded as public servants.

Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen has thought it but right to acquaint Her Majesty's Secretary with the project that has been planned by the National Council, and has received the following telegram from Sir Arthur Rigge:—

"In reply to your telegram the Queen has refrained from expressing approval of any particular scheme for commemorating the Diamond Jubilee, though, of course, any project for the relief of the sufferings of the sick in Canada will be assured of Her Majesty's sincere sympathy."

It is proposed, therefore, to open a fund for establishing such an Order of Home Helpers in Canada. Not less than a million dollars should be raised to make the scheme effective. This would mean but a contribution of one dollar from every family in the Dominion.

The Bank of Montreal has kindly undertaken to receive subscriptions for the Victorian Order of Home Helpers in Canada at any of their branches.

Allow me to express the hope that you will bring before your readers the institution of this fund as a means whereby a suitable national commemoration of Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee may be carried out by the people of the whole Dominion unitedly, and in a manner which will be in accordance with the known wishes of the Queen and be of permanent benefit to all parts of the country.

THE ST. BONIFACE ELECTION

People Vote "Non-Content" With School Settlement.

Sir Charles Tupper's Opinion.

MONTREAL, Feb. 22.—A despatch from Winnipeg reports that the friends of Mr. Laugelien won a decisive victory over the Greenway Government in St. Boniface on Saturday last when Laugelien defeated Bothard by 192 votes, the total number polled being 400.

When it is considered that both the Ottawa and Manitoba Governments went in to win and that a great many electors went over from Winnipeg to vote for the Government candidate, this victory is of considerable importance.

OTTAWA, Feb. 22.—Sir Charles Tupper is of opinion that the result of the election in St. Boniface on Saturday is an indication that the Roman Catholics are by no means satisfied with the school settlement and that they would make their influence felt in future elections, both in the Federal and provincial arena.
