TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.)

Riel's Trial. WINNIPEG, July 21. Louis Riel was arraigned for trial at Regina, yesterday morning. Stipendiary Richardson occupied the bench, and associated with him was Henry Lejune, Justice of the Peace.

The prisoner was brought from the barracks in a wagon, under a strong escort, and conducted to a cell under the court house, which was fitted up for his accommodation. He was carrying a ball under one of his arms, the chain being fastened under his left ankle.

His lawyers are Lemieux, Q. C., Fitzpatrick, Q. C., Greenshields, Montreal, and Johnston, Regina. The counsel for the prosecution are Robinson, Q. C., and Osler, Q. C., Toronto; Barbridge, Q. C., deputy minister of justice, Ottawa, Cosgrain, Quebec, and Scott, Mayor of Regina. The jury panel was called and only three failed to respond. Gen. Middleton and Sir J. and Lieut. Governor Dewdney were present.

Riel walked into court with a firm step, his face betraying considerable agitation. The indictment was read and the clerk asked Louis Riel, are you guilty or not guilty. Lemieux then announced that he would file an appeal against the jurisdiction of the court. Robinson said he, with associated counsel, appeared in behalf of the Government. Fitzpatrick then read the appeal. After argument on the jurisdiction of the court is settled, Greenshields will ask for an adjournment for six weeks, to enable the defence to procure a number of necessary witnesses.

Halifax Battalion Banqueted.

LONDON, ONT., July 21. The Halifax Battalion reached here yesterday evening at 5.30. They were banqueted by the citizens.

HALIFAX, July 21. The Halifax Battalion will probably arrive here on Friday. They will be given a rousing reception by the citizens, and the ladies of Halifax will give them a grand reception in the Exhibition building.

NIAGARA FALLS, July 21. The Halifax regiment arrived here last evening from the Northwest en route for home. Although their intended visit to the Falls was not telegraphed until seven o'clock in the evening, the entire population turned out to greet them. As soon as the train steamed into the station fireworks were set off, and the cheers and the sunburst faces of the men made their appearance in the car windows, were deafening. The men were billeted out to the different hotels for their meals, and as comfortable bunks had already been made in the coaches the men remained in them all night. Dr. Ferguson, M. P., Mayor Butler and a deputation of Aldermen entertained the officers at B. Shiel's dining rooms. They will march in a body to view the Falls to-day and take the train at 9.30 a. m., for Toronto.

Aquatic.

PITTSBURG July 20. The final heats in Teemer's regatta came off this afternoon. It was a single scull race for a purse of \$900. It was won by Gaudaur in 19.32. Teemer came in second, 19.35; and Ten Eyck third, 19.54. The starters in the race were Teemer, Gaudaur, Ten Eyck, Hamm, McKay and Hosmer. In the double scull race between Gaudaur and Hosmer, Hamm and McKay, the former won. The consolation race was won by McKay, with Hosmer and Hamm a tie.

The Columbia Rebellion—10,000 Men Killed.

WASHINGTON, July 21. Under date of July 19, Admiral Jonell has sent to the Navy Department, from Savanella, a report of the condition of affairs in Columbia. He makes mention of the recent battle between the Government forces and the revolutionists in which 10,000 men are said to have been killed.

Prorogation of Parliament.

OTTAWA, July 21. The Dominion Parliament prorogued this afternoon. The Governor General made a speech to Col. Amyot's Battalion, which has just returned from the North West. He thanked them in the Queen's name for the admirable services they rendered during the rebellion.

Fatal Railway Collision.

OTTAWA, July 21. A collision occurred on the Grand Trunk Railway yesterday, near London, Ont., between a special freight and construction train. Both engines were smashed, ten cars wrecked, and the engine driver on the construction train was killed instantly.

Sir Leonard's Return.

OTTAWA, July 21. Sir Leonard Tilley arrived from England to-day. His health is much improved. Sir Leonard sends his greetings to his friends in the Maritime Provinces.

Those troubled with sleeplessness are invited to try the following remedy:—It is based upon the theory that sleep is prevented by an excess of blood in the brain and may be induced by drawing it to other parts of the body. "Having assumed the usual posture of repose, inhale and exhale slowly and steadily long breaths, devoting the whole attention to making the inhalations and exhalations of exactly the same length. The length should be much greater than that of ordinary breathing, although not sufficient to disturb the circulation by working the lungs to their utmost capacity. Any person who has force of will enough to concentrate his whole attention on the maintenance of this style of breathing can compel sleep in very unfavorable circumstances."

In a speech on public instruction in 1850, Victor Hugo said:—"God will be found at the end of all. Let us not forget Him, and let us teach Him to all. A prominent San Francisco drug house has sent 2,000 pounds of arsenic into the valley in the past few days. This gives some idea of the onslaught that is being made on the grasshoppers. The preparation is found to work like a charm. The hoppers eat it, wet or dry, and rather seem to like it, and there is no danger of their communicating the poison to the fruit or anything of that kind, as they never fly after eating it, simply contenting themselves by crawling off and hunting a shady place to die in.
