Youth In FLQ Terrorist Case Falls To Appear

MONTREAL (CP) — A youth accused of taking part in terrorist activities blamed on the Front de Liberation Quebecois did not appear in court Friday and the crown immediately said it will seek to have his bail cancelled. Gilles Brunson, 19, is one of 17 persons facing various charges in connection with the terrorist activities that started last spring and apparently ended May 20. All the defendants had been ordered to appear in court to hear charges read against them in a formal arraignment. In other developments, Jacques Groulx, 19, was ordered held for jury trial Oct. 7 on a charge of non-capital murder in connection with the bombing in London, Ont., after visiting the O'Malley family in Alberton.
