TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 10. Hon. McKenzie Bowell read and laid on the table letters from J. Stewart Tupper and Hugh J. McDonald, denying the statements concerning them contained in Rykert's timber limit correspondence. Messrs. McNeill, Tisdale, Wood (Westmoreland), Gerouard, Weldon (St. John), Casgrain, Holton, and Messrs. Lister and Kirkpatrick (the two last named without power), were appointed to inquire into the charges arising out of the loss of Bremner's furs. Dr. Roome moved a resolution affirming the expediency of establishing a Dominion Health Department. He thought that there were probably 25,000 deaths and 300,000 cases of severe illness annually which might be prevented were proper precautions taken. After some discussion, Sir John Macdonald asked for the withdrawal of the motion, as the matter was one which could be more satisfactorily attended to by the provincial governments. Mr. Laurier agreed with this view, and the motion was withdrawn.

Another Explosion.

LONDON, March 9. A terrific explosion occurred to-day in Morsa Colliery, Glamorganshire, Wales, which, it is feared was attended with much loss of life. Hundreds of miners were entombed. Communication with them is impossible for the present, and it is feared all have perished.

LATER.

LONDON, March 10. Later advices from Morsa colliery are that 300 miners are entombed. Many were rescued from the workings nearest the main shaft. Most of those taken out were unhurt. Heavy falls of rock prevent the explorers from reaching the more remote workings. Choke-damp is spreading. It is estimated that at least 160 lives were lost.

The Wimbledon Team.

OTTAWA, March 10. The delay granted the first twenty men in grand aggregate match at the D. R. A. meeting to notify the Militia Deputy whether they will take positions upon this year's rifle team to England expired to-day. Out of the twenty, three have declined, one has not been heard from, but is expected to decline, and one has been disqualified. The next five who have been notified are Capt. Longworth, P. E. I. G. A.; Private Davis, 10th Royals; Major Garrison, Halifax G. A.; Staff-Sergt. Pink, 43rd Battalion; Lieut. E. Smith, St. John Rifles. Lieut.-Col. Prior, M. P., will command the team, and Major Todd has been selected as Adjutant.

A New Move.

MONTREAL, March 10. Dr. McEachern has purchased some fifty acres of land just outside the city limits for the purpose of erecting an establishment, the purpose of which is to develop an outside market in British and other European countries as well as the United States for the best quality of Canadian-bred horses.

Gladstone's Amendment Rejected.

LONDON, March 10. After further debate in the House of Commons this evening, on Gladstone's amendment to the Parnell Commissioners' report, the amendment was rejected, 339 to 265.

Abolishing Tax Exemptions.

HALIFAX, Mar. 10. The City Council to-night voted to petition the Legislature to abolish all tax exemptions.

BOSTON MARKETS.—A circular of the 6th says: The receipts of potatoes for the last six days have been 101,500 bushels; previous six days 91,000 bushel. Chenangoes are quiet at from 58 to 60c. The egg market closes firm, with prices ranging from 15 to 17c. There is little life in the fish market. The late decline in mackerel has been followed by very little if any improvement in the demand. The sale of smelts is unlawful after March 15, and no further shipments should be made.
