FIRST ARRIVALS.—The schooners Champion and May Queen are discharging coal at McMillan's wharf. These, we understand, are the first arrivals of the season with coal.

EARLY PLANTING.—An exchange says that the farmers on the south side of Nova Scotia have been planting their potatoes for about a week past, and now the crop is almost all in the ground.

CLEAR OF ICE.—The Agricultural reports Summerside harbor clear of ice. The same paper also speaks in terms of praise of the work performed in that harbor by the steamer Stanley on Thursday last.

STILL ANOTHER.—Halifax has another elopement, that of a colored woman who, forgetful of her duty to her husband, took passage by the Carrol for Boston on Monday last with a wicked admirer.

POLICE COURT.—Francis McCarey, drunk, fined \$1 or four days imprisonment; John McKenna, do. do.; Joseph Valley, drunk, cautioned and discharged; George Goodnough, arrested on complaint of his father for disorderly conduct, discharged.

SEAL FIGHT.—An interesting spectacle was witnessed by a large number on shore last night. Two seals were seen off in the harbor engaged in mortal combat. The fight was a long and bitter one, lasting two hours; and the sea was lashed into foam by the combatants. Some parties from the shore attempted to shoot them and fired several shots, which put an end to the battle.—North Sydney Herald.

Mr. McMillan was a native of Wood Islands, and was a member of the Caledonian Club of this city, whose flag is flying at half-mast to-day as a token of respect to his memory.

GOT LEFT.—A Pictou policeman visited New Glasgow, N. S., one day last week to arrest a woman for violating the Scott Act. After securing the woman he allowed her to go into an adjoining room to arrange her toilet—the officer waiting outside the door. The Railroad Released.

OTTAWA, April 14. John D. Chipman, of St. Stephen, N. B., and Judge Downes, of Calais, Me., had an interview with the Minister of Customs Saturday, with respect to the seizure some time ago of the Penobscot and Calais Railway, for violation of the Customs laws. They produced sworn testimony to show that in ten years total duty on material not entered at the Custom House would not exceed thirty dollars and that the seizure was malicious and groundless. Hon. Mr. Bowell was thoroughly satisfied with the case made out and released the road.

Passed at Sea.

QUEENSTOWN, April 14. The Cunard Steamer Etruria, which sailed from Liverpool yesterday for New York, reports having passed the Guion steamer Wisconsin returning to Liverpool. The Wisconsin sailed from Liverpool on Saturday for Queenstown. She has not yet arrived at Queenstown, nor is she reported as having put back to Liverpool.

Manhood Suffrage in St. John's.

HALIFAX, April 14. A cablegram from St. John's Nfld., to the Halifax Herald says the Manhood Suffrage Bill has passed the third reading in the Assembly. It gives a right to vote to every householder aged 21, and every man not a householder aged 25. It adds 12,000 new voters to the list.

More Immigrants.

HALIFAX, April 14. Over one thousand immigrants arrived last night and to-day. The Sarnia brought 650 and the Scandinavian 400. Among the Scandinavian passengers were 280 Scotch Crofters for Wolsley, Man. They were a fine body of men and were despatched on a special train. All immigrants proceeded west.

Poisoned Himself.

QUEBEC, April 13. It now turns out that Walter Creighton, manager of the Bank of Montreal here, whose death occurred yesterday, poisoned himself by an overdose of narcotic taken to produce sleep.

The Cotton Combine.

MONTREAL, April 13. The Cotton Companies will hold a meeting here on the 24th inst., to consider the advisability of renewing the cotton combine upon a closer and more abiding basis.

LONDON, April 14. Wm. O'Brien has entered a libel action against Lord Salisbury for certain remarks made by the latter in a recent speech at Walford.
